The first show, Diggers (National Geographic TV), aired a few days ago and the second, American Diggers (Spike TV), is scheduled to air on March 20. The public outcry on social media has been strong and professional organizations such as the SAA, SHA, and RPA have mounted letter writing campaigns urging members to voice their opposition. The SCA Board, too, is preparing a response to both shows and will continue to monitor developments. The SCA strongly urges members to learn more about the controversy and, if so inclined, to contact the companies involved to urge them to stop production on the shows. Lakotas arrested halting Keystone XL pipeline trucks Posted by <u>Brenda Norrell</u> - March 5, 2012 at 7:05 pm

PINE RIDGE, S.D. -- Lakotas on Pine Ridge Indian land in South Dakota were arrested as they blockaded tarsands pipeline trucks from entering their territory on Monday, March 5. Lakota human rights activists Alex White Plume, Debra White Plume, Sam Long Black Cat, Andrew Iron Shell and Terrell Eugene Iron Shell were arrested late Monday. They were charged with disorderly conduct and taken to the jail in Kyle, S.D.

An action alert was sent out shortly before the arrests: "Calling all Lakota men on the Pine Ridge Reservation to come to Wanblee, South Dakota."

The alert said "Pipeline trucks are being held there at the border by our Lakota Oyate, Oglala Sioux Tribal Police and State Troopers in an effort to keep them from entering our territory. Even the state troopers told the trucks they have to turn around and cannot bring their pipeline or other materials on to our reservation."

"Pipeline trucks are refusing to turn around claiming they have corporate rights that supersede any other law."

Reports from the scene say that the trucks are being allowed to pass, as Lakotas are being arrested attempting to halt the trucks from entering their sovereign territory."

Lakotas joined Native Americans and First Nations to protest the Keystone XL pipeline at the White House in September. Debra White Plume was among those arrested. Lakotas urged the US to halt the plan for the pipeline, which would cut through Ogallala Aquifer, and endanger land, water and people from Alberta, Canada to Texas. First Nations in Canada are also protesting the pipeline and the ongoing devastation from the Alberta tarsands in Cree territory.

TransCanada, the company behind the <u>rejected Keystone XL tar sands pipeline</u>, sent a letter to the U.S. State Department on February 27 announcing its intention to <u>circumvent U.S.</u> <u>environmental review</u> and build the southern portion of the proposed crude oil pipeline from Cushing, Oklahoma, to Port Arthur, Texas.

This six week writing workshop will focus on bolstering critical scientific composition skills while providing guidance in drafting graduate theses and dissertations. Good Morning California! How Long Have Gas Companies Been Fracking Around In Your Backyard?

What most Californians don't realize is that fracking has been taking place throughout their state for over sixty years. US towns and communities have been in the midst of an unprecedented gas drilling boom, using a process called hydraulic fracturing or "fracking." With each new drill comes frightening reports of poisoned drinking water, polluted air, mysterious animal deaths, industrial disasters and explosions.

<u>America's Water Infrastructure Shows Its Age</u> — The National Debate About How to Pay for Repairs; <u>Hundreds of billions of dollars are needed for renovation and</u> <u>improvement. But what projects will be chosen, and who will pay?</u>

Early Wednesday morning, a faulty patch failed on a water main in suburban Washington, D.C., creating a sinkhole the size of a king bed that closed the road above indefinitely.

Just over a week ago, heavy rains inundated the sewer system in San Antonio, Texas. The two affected pipes spilled more than 757,000 liters (200,000 gallons) of untreated sewage into local water bodies.

And last month, tens of thousands of gallons of raw sewage poured from a ruptured pipe, slowing rush-hour traffic in Delray Beach, Florida. A water department inspection later found that sewer gases had disintegrated one-third of the 30-year-old pipe.

In ways big and small, water systems across the country are not meeting the basic obligation to provide a reliable supply of clean water. Pipes that deliver drinking water are rusting, clogging, and cracking. Reservoirs are losing storage capacity. During heavy rainstorms, sewers that combine domestic wastewater and street runoff are pouring untreated sewage into lakes, rivers, and coastal areas.

But while the effects of America's aging and eroding plumbing and water supply system are readily apparent, what to do about it is not.

The draft legislation, currently being considered by the U.S. House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure's Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment, would lower the cost of large water projects for consumers at a time when infrastructure is aging and in need of replacement.

(03/12/12) Las Vegas, NV - To better understand the lifestyle, behavioral, environmental and genetic factors that may prevent or cause cancer, the American Cancer Society (ACS) is launching its <u>Cancer Prevention Study-3</u>. ACS is looking for 300,000 adult volunteers, ages 30 to 65, from various backgrounds and in every state, including Nevada.

Liddy Hora with ACS explains.

"The study is open to anyone who is, first of all, willing to make a long-term commitment to the study, which involves completing periodic follow-up surveys at home for the next 20 to 30 years."

Hora says volunteers should view this as an opportunity to help eliminate cancer.

"A lot of people have come to me and said, 'You know, I'm a caregiver. What can I do to help support my loved one who is dealing with cancer?' I look at them and I say, 'This is a great opportunity to become involved in the Cancer Prevention Study-3.'"

Hora says this is the third major cancer study undertaken by the Cancer Society. Previous results have been used for decades to help health professionals develop guidelines for prevention.
