Nevada & Utah Tribal Leaders: Dear Tribal Leader:

On behalf of the Confederated Tribes of the Goshute Reservation, I write to alert you that the final opportunity to object to the Bureau of Land Management's Final *Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) is* **October 1, 2012**. As you may know, the Southern Nevada Water Authority's (SNWA) groundwater development project intends to siphon more than 37.1 billion gallons of groundwater per year from at least four valleys in central Nevada and pump it 300 miles to the Las Vegas valley. This project poses a grave threat to the water resources and traditional way of life of the Confederated Goshute Tribes, and all Tribes and Indian people in the States of Nevada and Utah.

SNWA's groundwater development project has been described as one of the biggest threats to traditional ways of life. The BLM will not be able to adequately protect millions of acres of public and Tribal lands from massive water depletion, land subsidence, and harmful impacts to cultural resources. This project will result in direct, harmful impacts to the Tribes' ability to engage in traditional practices of hunting, gathering and fishing on ancestral lands. <u>Moreover, the BLM has failed to honor its</u>

obligation to conduct meaningful consultation with Indian tribes on a government-togovernment basis, and to protect Tribal resources, as required by law.

We have been advised that you must have participated in the environmental review process and exhausted all available administrative appeals if you wish to challenge the BLM's compliance with federal environmental laws in the future.

A grant from the U.S. Department of Energy was awarded to University of Nevada, Reno biochemistry professor John Cushman. The grant is for \$14.3 million and will allow for Cushman and the other members of his research team, including Anne Borland from Newcastle University, James Hartwell from the University of Liverpool and Xiaohan Yang from the Oak Ridge National Laboratory, to pursue research on crops used for biofuel. According to a statement, the team will "develop novel technologies to redesign bioenergy crops to grow on economically marginal agricultural lands and produce yields of biomass that can readily be converted to biofuels."

The grant will last for five years, with \$7.6 million going to UNR and the rest distributed to other institutions. Cushman is the team leader.

A term has emerged over the past decade describing our part of America. The "Pacific Salmon States" are a network of rivers, streams and creeks that stitch together a diverse, sprawling <u>landscape</u> of forested mountains, rich bottomlands and productive ocean resources. It describes the West Coast of our continent – California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Alaska – rather loosely defined as anywhere Pacific salmon exist.
