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A MUST READ THE POWER OF PRAYER !!!

This photo has been circulating. Let me tell you the story behind it.

Raymond Robinson of Cross Lake has been fasting alongside Theresa Spence. He's 10 hours behind her without eating. During the Jan. 11 march to Parliament Hill, I was Theresa's eagle staff carrier and made sure to walk alongside him and Jean, the other faster.

During a stop to allow those behind to catch up, Raymond crouched. Wincing, he said he wasn't



feeling well. He got up and walked when the rally proceeded, but stopped again. He said he was light-headed and had a pain in his abdomen. Police asked if he wanted a ride back to camp but he said no. He recovered a bit and marched on.

A block later, he stopped again. I thought for sure he wouldn't be able to go any further. The whole rally stopped, the organizer saying "We won't leave a warrior behind."

Then the organizer called for women drummers to come up. Within a minute we were encircled by these women, singing for Raymond. I stood behind him and a woman asked me to move. She had her hand extended toward him. I'm praying for him, she said. Another woman smudged him with sage.

The song stopped. Raymond got up for a second but bent back down. It wasn't looking good. Then he stood up again. He looked behind and put his arm in the air, acknowledging the crowd and telling them he was OK.

He never showed weakness again during the march and proceeded with the rally with more energy than I had seen him, shouting "You can't stop me, Harper" and the like. He went on to deliver a speech at Parliament Hill.

It was amazing to see that, the power of the women and the drums. I'll never forget it.

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### Actions across Canada protest gov't attacks on Aboriginal rights

CORNWALL, Ontario—Some 500 people blocked the International Bridge here linking Canada and the U.S. through Akwesasne First Nation territory Jan. 5.

The action was one of many across Canada to protest recently adopted federal Bill C-45 and other laws, which give Ottawa increased powers to dispose of Native reserve land, and weaken environmental protection for thousands of waterways.

Half of Canada's 1.2 million Aboriginal population—who identify themselves as North American Indian, Métis or Inuit—live in rural areas.

Protesters voiced support for Northern Ontario First Nation Attawapiskat Chief Theresa Spence, who has been on a hunger strike since Dec. 11, demanding that Prime Minister Stephen Harper and Gov. Gen. David Johnston meet with her to discuss Aboriginal demands.

Marchers included Mohawk ironworkers and youth, and the president of the Cornwall and District Labour Council.

"Canada now has seven different laws [in preparation] that attack our rights," Akwesasne resident Dana Leigh told the marchers. "This is only the beginning."

Since early December actions for Aboriginal rights under the banner "Idle No More" have been organized across Canada, including a 13-day blockade of a rail line in southwestern Ontario.

Harper and Johnston each met with a delegation of Aboriginal leaders Jan. 11. In an attempt to undermine support for indigenous peoples' mobilizations, Ottawa Jan. 7 released results of a federally commissioned audit of the Attawapiskat nation's finances, reporting inadequate accounting for the spending of millions of dollars of federal funding. Bad housing conditions brought Attawapiskat to national attention in 2011.

Brad West, communications staffer for United Steelworkers District 3, told the *Militant* about affirmative action programs the union participates in in Western Canada. "So far over 400 Aboriginals have been hired in the mines through this program, coming from 150 different First Nations. One-third are women," he said.

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## Public comment sought on gold mine expansion

ELKO - Federal land managers are seeking public comment concerning a proposal to expand a gold mine about 45 miles northwest of Elko.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management has released the draft environmental impact statement for Barrick-Dee Mining Venture's Arturo Mine Project proposal to expand the Dee Gold Mine.

The proposed project would be located at the previously approved Dee Gold Mine site.

It would disturb about 2,774 acres of public land and provide an estimated 240 jobs. Plans call for about 10 years of mining and ore processing, followed by three years of site closure and reclamation.

The BLM's Elko District Office is accepting written comments through March 4.

A public meeting will be held Feb. 6 at the office.
