Walmart agreed Tuesday to pay \$82 million after pleading guilty to criminal charges that the company improperly dumped hazardous waste at stores across California. The big-box retailer pleaded guilty at the U.S. District Court in San Francisco to six misdemeanor counts of violating the Clean Water Act by negligently dumping pollutants from its stores into waste bins and sewer systems. Walmart also pleaded guilty in a similar case in Missouri and agreed to settle a civil suit brought by the Environmental Protection Agency.

The project is a shared online collection of local history as captured by individuals and cultural heritage institutions alike.

Every year, natural disasters wreak havoc on communities around the world, and it can take months, years, and even decades for infrastructure and homes to be rebuilt. Lives are lost and disrupted and permanent scars are recorded and remembered in family and neighborhood history for generations.
