### National Fish and Wildlife Foundation: Acres for America

Acres for America, a partnership between Walmart Stores, Inc. and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, was established to provide funding for projects that conserve important habitat for fish, wildlife, and plants through acquisition of interest in real property. The goal of the Acres for America program is to offset the footprint of Walmart's domestic facilities on at least an acre by acre basis through these acquisitions. All grant awards require a minimum 1:1 match of cash or contributed goods and services. Preference will be given to acquisitions that are part of published conservation plans (North American Waterfowl Management Plan, Partners in Flight, State Wildlife Action Plans, or Endangered Species Act Recovery Plans). Applicants are strongly encouraged to contact the Partnership Office Director for the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation in their area to discuss project ideas prior to applying. ### Grants Enhance Skateboard Parks in Low-Income Communities **Tony Hawk Foundation**

The Tony Hawk Foundation is dedicated to funding the construction of new, quality skateboard parks located in low-income communities throughout the United States. 
### Funds for Healthy Living Programs in Selected Communities and States **Aetna Foundation Regional Grants Program**

### **Water Suppliers**

Chile's president, Michelle Bachelet, is attempting to <u>pass a bill that would restore water as a purely public resource</u>, replacing laws passed in 1981 that allow water privatization, the *Santiago Times* reported. Activists say that water privatization is hurting some of Chile's poorest residents. Rain storms and state intervention have <u>relieved pressure on 14 California communities that were at risk of running out of water</u>, *Reuters* reported. However, rain over the past couple months has not been nearly enough to break the 3-year drought gripping the state.

Water prices in South Australia are the highest in the country, and residential water bills in the state increased more than 30 percent last year, according to a report by the Essential Services Commission, *ABC* reported. The state's water minister explained that the prices were higher than elsewhere because of higher treatment costs and fewer customers.

#### Water and Business

Nature Climate Change has published a <u>special series of papers on climate change and the</u> <u>associated water challenges it poses to businesses</u>. The papers also address case studies and possible solutions available to businesses to cope with these risks.

The latest best-sellers and films are also available as is a rapidly growing audio-book, e-book, and music collection.

Members are encouraged to recommend materials for purchase, attend workshops, and participate in literature and film discussions groups. Currently there are five book discussion groups on a variety of genres and three writers' groups offering peer-to-peer support, advice, and camaraderie.


