#### **Utah River Running Archives**

#### Overview

River running has grown from the obscure pastime of a few hardy explorers to a major component of the tourist industry in the US and around the world. Each year thousands of people gravitate to wild rivers, challenging themselves in whitewater, seeking quiet and beauty, and experiencing nature unchanged. The history of this growth has not been well-documented because river running is done far from the public eye, and thus the legacy of river running was largely an oral one for many years, passing from campfire to board ramp.

#### Founded

In 1985, the Special Collections Department at the J.Willard Marriott Library launched an effort to capture the history of river running in the Intermountain West before those who made and lived it disappeared. Since that time we have amassed a wide-ranging collection of oral histories, photographs, films, publications, and manuscript materials that document the history of river travel on the Colorado River system. Not only

First of all, I don't wanna be on fb buuut....gotta spread the word somehow - so fb friends, help me out! Tonight was Native American Heritage Night at AT&T Park for the San Francisco Giants vs Padres game. There was a group of mostly white guys that were passing around a headdress. I went over to one guy and asked him to take it off, and after much convincing that is was disrespectful he agreed to take it off. Minutes later, another quy in the group has it on. Another native guy (Kimball Bighorse) sitting next to me went over with me and as we were attempting to explain to the group of drunk guys why it wasn't ok - especially on Native Heritage Night - security gets calls. I started crying because I was so upset that people are idiots/the genocide of our people/cultures and the guy asks/yells at me because he's getting embarrassed and flustered "what do you want from me?" so I said "give me the headdress" and he did. Security shows up and are some sad ignorant people of color that couldn't comprehend what was happening and demanded I give them the headdress back because the "native" friend the group came with showed up and wanted it back and called police over. At that point I was like YOU CAN ARREST ME IF YOU THINK I'M GOING TO HAND THIS FAKE ASS CRAFT STORE DISRESPECTFUL HEADDRESS BACK TO SOME DRUNKEN WHITE GUY AND SAD TOKEN. So me and my friend get ushered back to the food stands and are getting kicked out. 2 cops

ripped the headdress out of my hands and refuse to tell us if/why we are being arrested and why we are being asked to leave. then one tough guy cop goes "if you're not going willingly we'll make you" and 2 cops grab me by my arms and twist them and pull them up behind my back so far I think they are going to pop out of socket. we walk about 40 feet and I'm squirming and yelling the whole way that they're hurting me and then one of them grabs me by my hair and throws me on the ground. as I'm getting cuffed i see my friend, Kimball Bighorse, (who was recording all this) laid out on the ground with 4 cops on him. they take us out of the game and let us go an hour later because they had ABSOLUTELY NO REASON TO ARREST US. I am beyond disgusted at the guys at the game, the people (including native around us who said nothing), the giants security for allowed that "headdress" inside to begin with, the police, and the San Francisco Giants organization as a whole for trying to host a heritage night without some type of cultural sensitive training. I would appreciate any help spreading the word about this and holding the team accountable and hopefully providing evidence for the native mascot issue that is under heavy media attention and fire right now. Sparks Museum's event series *Celebrating 150 years of Nevada History and Heritage* continues this summer with a special performance by **Sourdough Slim & Robert Armstrong** on July 11<sup>th</sup>, 2014 at 7 p.m.

The talented and humorous duo will celebrate Nevada's Sesquicentennial birthday with songs and tales from Nevada. The history and songs of the Pioneer Days and 150 years ago in Nevada are intertwined with hot pickin', old time harmony singing, stratospheric yodeling and the ethereal lilt of the musical saw. The passion and enthusiasm of the hilariously entertaining vaudevillian duo promise an evening filled with music, poetry, history and fun!

Sourdough Slim's performances range from the National Cowboy Poetry Gathering to The Lincoln Center's Roots of American Music Festival and the Carnegie Hall Folk Festival. His fast-paced stage show and truly astounding yippie-ti-yi style won him the Academy of Western Artists 2001 Will Rogers Award for "Yodeler of the Year" and 2009, 2010 and 2011 nomination for "Entertainer of the Year" from the Western Music Association.

On July 11<sup>th</sup>, the Museum will open at 6 pm so that visitors can enjoy the history museum and the special Art exhibit on display in the Cultural Center - *One Is Silver, the Other Is Gold*.

2014 is not only the Sesquicentennial birthday of Nevada becoming a State, but also the Silver Anniversary of the Nevada Arts Council's Folklife Apprenticeship Program. This special NV150 exhibit features 22 award winning Nevada artists from the indigenous Paiute, Shoshone, and Washoe peoples and the skilled ranchers, miners, loggers, and railroad workers who have long been a part of the state's history. Exhibit artists also include more recent immigrants from all parts of North America, Europe, Latin America, Africa, and Asia. This exhibit embraces the vibrant face and culture of Nevada today. *One is Silver and the Other Is Gold* is at the Sparks Museum and Cultural Center though the end of July.

In October 2013 The Sparks Museum kicked off a yearlong lecture and event series which will culminate in the NV 150 Western Heritage Festival on October 3, 2014 on Victorian Square. So far the special series has included several lectures and changing exhibits focusing on Nevada's history and culture, an award winning parade float, an NV150 tribute by Mark Twain, and more. The Museum currently also has a special exhibit on display at the Reno Tahoe Airport - *Planes*, *Trains and Automobiles*, *Runways to Rockets*- which highlights the history and heritage of Sparks. Keep an eye on the Museum's website for upcoming Sesquicentennial Events in Sparks including an exhibit highlighting the 50th Anniversary of the Wilderness Act in August and September.

For 29 years the Sparks Museum has been funded almost exclusively by donations and memberships. The performance on July 11<sup>th</sup> by Sourdough Slim & Robert Armstrong is a fundraising event. Tickets are \$15 per person and \$12 for Museum Members. Reservations are suggested but not required. Museum doors open at 6 pm and the show starts at 7pm.

Gene went on to join the Carpenters Union Local No. 971. He retired after 35 years of service in 2011. He worked as journeyman carpenter and superintendent for the last 20 years of his career.

He was called home on June 26, 2014. He was preceded in death by his father, Floyd Harry. He is survived by his mother, Charlotte Harry; brothers, Norman and Edward; sisters, Debra and Carolyn; children, Clint, Kellie, Craig, and Eugene, Jr.; grandchildren Kylie and Jace Harry, and a large extended family.

A visitation will be held at Ross, Burke & Knobel funeral home on Sunday, June 29, 2014 from 2:00 to 4:00 pm. The family will hold a traditional Cry Dance at the Harry residence in Nixon on Sunday evening at 8:00 pm.
