Giant Mushroom Tower Sprouts at MoMA PS1

A giant building made of mushrooms and corn has sprouted in Queens at <u>MoMA PS1</u> as part of the annual Young Architects

Program, co-sponsored by the Museum of Modern Art and PS1. As reported by the <u>New</u> <u>York Times</u>, the tower, titled Hy-Fi, is the work of New York-based architects <u>the</u> <u>Living</u>.

Each year, emerging talents compete to build a temporary structure in the Long Island City institution's outdoor courtyard. As always, museum visitors will get the opportunity to experience the piece all summer, particularly during "<u>Warm Up</u>," the museum's popular outdoor concert series.

Hy-Fi measures 40 feet fall, with curving cylinders branching out from its base, but what is most remarkable about the project are its building materials. The Living, in collaboration with <u>Ecovative</u>, of Green Island, New York, have developed a special biodegradable brick made of agricultural byproducts, namely



chopped up corn stalks, mixed with mycelium mushrooms.

The latter's living root structure fuse together the biological material, creating a solid object that can serve as a strong, lightweight, weather-resistant building material. The towering pavilion was thoroughly analyzed before it was build in order to make sure that the innovative bricks would be structurally sound.

"We can try to do things differently; we don't have to accept the ways that buildings are always designed," lead designer David Benjamin said in a video for the <u>Creators Project</u>. Without a doubt, *Hy-Fi* takes green, sustainable architecture and design to a new level, bringing architecture to life through actual living biological organisms.

At the end of the summer, the structure will be composted. A building that sprang from the earth will return to earth, literally "dust to dust."

<u>The Living's Hy-Fi</u> will be on view at MoMA PS1 through September 6.

Water Scarcity

New research has <u>quantified the amount of water being virtually exported</u> from and imported to Chinese provinces, confirming that arid regions are sending huge amounts of water to more water-rich areas in the form of agricultural products, *Reuters* reported. The research, published in the journal *Environmental Science and Technology*, found that this imbalance is effectively outsourcing environmental problems to the arid regions, while much of the benefit is being felt in wetter, industrialized areas that export the final products.

Growing water scarcity in Texas is <u>placing pressure on water users in the Brazos River basin</u>, <u>including major manufacturing plants for Dow Chemical</u>, *The Texas Tribune* reported. Dow is the most senior water rights holder in the basin, meaning it could force agricultural and municipal users to cut back on their water use if river management is not improved.

Water Conflict

<u>Distrust of the government is at the heart of a water conflict outside of Mexico City</u>, the *Los Angeles Times* reported. A violent protest in May over a proposed water pipeline centered on one community's belief that the government was planning to steal their water and give it to a more affluent city nearby—a claim that the government disputes.

Glaciers

Soil erosion and particulate air pollution are creating <u>dust that is darkening snow on the world's</u> <u>ice caps and glaciers</u>, <u>speeding their melting</u>, the *Guardian* reported. The dust creates a darker surface that causes the snow to absorb more heat from the sun, and as glaciers and ice caps retreat, more soil is exposed to erosion, fueling the process.

- **Description:** 4th Grade
 - Two to three class periods.

This two/three part lesson will introduce the main elements of the Navajo Long Walk during the period of 1864-1868. During Part I, students will gain information from teacher presentation and working in collaborative groups by reading adapted text, observing and discussing historical photographs and maps. Part II will consist of a short session to help students organize their written information to create a short Info-Share (a dramatic presentation) for the whole class, and time for each group to do their sharing. A third session could be planned if not all groups were able to present.
