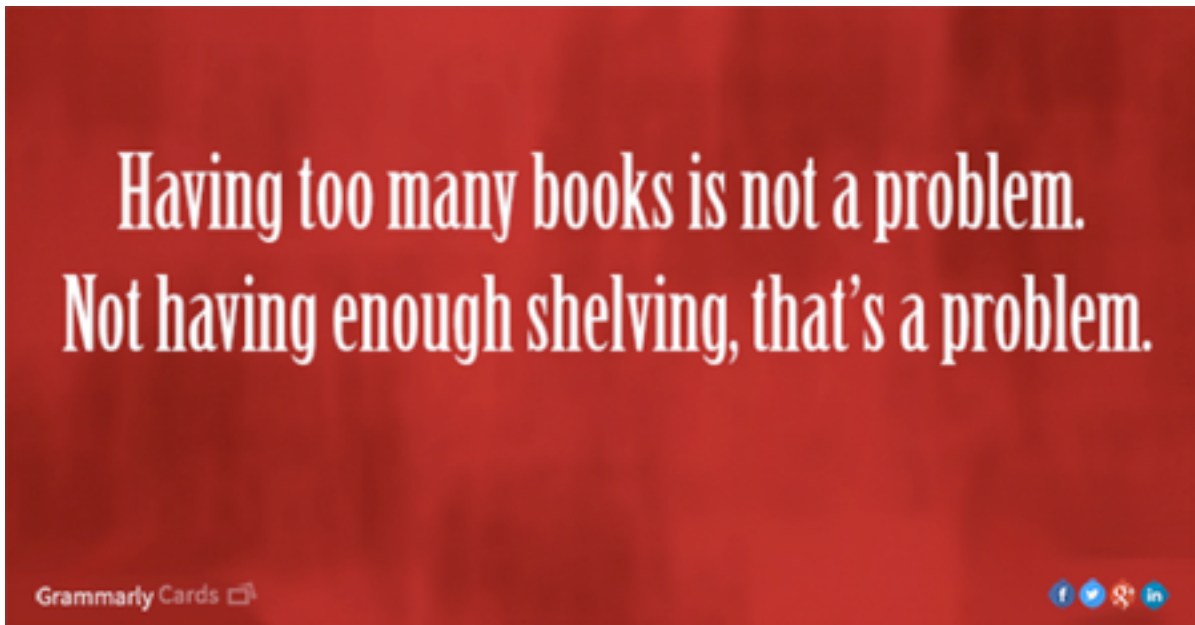

Chief Earl Old Person, Blackfeet Nation, Montana. Hereditary, Chief of the Blackfeet Nation and spiritual leader. Under his leadership the tribe has built a community college, industrial park, community center and tourist facilities.

He remains committed to advancing educational and business opportunities for his people. For his effectiveness as an advocate and lobbyist and unpretentious way of speaking with clarity, the American Civil Liberties Union of Montana gave him in 1998 its most prestigious award: The Jeanette Rankin Civil Liberties Award
Chief Old Person has met and has been acknowledged by presidents, numerous congressman, royalties and movie celebrities. He has served with the National Advisory Council on Aging, member of the National Security Council and Advisory Council to the Congressional delegation. Chief Old Person was also awarded the first lifetime member of the National JOM Association for his leadership in the fight for funding on a national level.
