
Open Tribal Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Coalitions Program

Tribal Coalition nonprofit organizations have accomplished this through technical assistance, expanding the capacity of the tribal coalitions, developing or enhancing appropriate standards for tribal governments, tribal nonprofits organizations, tribal organizations, victim services and victim service providers to increase the understanding of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. Native American Heritage Commission Public Meeting To Hear Comments On NAHC Consultation Policy California Native American Heritage Commission Notice of Public Hearing/Workshop on Proposed Regulations Re: Discovery, Disposition and Treatment of Native American Human Remains and Associated Grave Goods (Public Resources Code Section 5097.94, subdivisions (k) and (l); Section 5097.98)

Pursuant to California Government Code section 11346.45, the California Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) will hold a pre-notice public discussion to gather information concerning the adoption of proposed regulations to be added to Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations as follows:

1) Title 14, (proposed) Division 17, Native American Heritage Commission. The NAHC is considering adopting regulations to implement Public Resources Code section 5097.98 and would like to have public discussion about the following issues and any others relevant to Public Resources Code section 5097.98:

i. Whether only California Native American Tribes, as opposed to individuals, should be designated as Most Likely Descendants (MLD);

ii. What data should be used to determine tribal territories;

iii. What criteria and procedures should be considered by the NAHC in making an MLD designation when tribal territories overlap, including, but not limited to, rotation among tribes;

iv. What process and grounds should be used for removing an MLD from a project;

v. What process and grounds should be used for removing an MLD from the MLD list;

vi. What process should be followed by the NAHC to designate a second MLD when an MLD cannot serve, will not serve, or is removed from a project;

vii. Whether there should be a definition of "appropriate dignity";

viii. Whether there should be guidelines for serving as an MLD;

ix. Whether an MLD should serve for an entire project, even if the project includes another tribe's cultural area;

x. How to maintain the confidentiality of the location of discovered Native American remains; xi. Whether there should be a definition of "placed or buried with" for purposes of determining what are associated grave goods under subdivision (d)(2) of Public Resources Code section 5097.98;

xii. What measures should be used to enforce subdivision (e) of Public Resources Code section

5097.98 when the landowner reinters Native American remains and items associated and buried with remains; and

xiii. Whether there should be guidelines for the completion of a report by the MLD, with recording of the burial site with CHRIS, on the property deed, or possible submission to the NAHC for inclusion in the Sacred Lands File.

2) Title 14, (proposed) Division 17, Native American Heritage Commission. The NAHC is considering adopting regulations to create a formal mediation process to implement Public Resources Code section 5097.94 (k).

3) Title 14, (proposed) Division 17, Native American Heritage Commission. The NAHC is considering adopting regulations to create a model pre-burial agreement to implement Public Resources Code section 5097.94, subdivisions (k) and (l).

Environmental Review Training

HUD's Eastern Woodlands Office of Native American Programs in collaboration with the Seminole Tribe of Florida Native Learning Center invites you to attend the Environmental Review Training instructed by Eugene Goldfarb, University of Illinois - Chicago/Great Lakes Environmental Planning, Inc. in Green Bay, Wisconsin on November 4 - 6, 2014.

Environmental review allows Tribal government and other stakeholders to identify and evaluate alternative sites and designs that can mitigate adverse impacts and/or lower long-term maintenance costs. All federal projects require environmental assessment responsibilities under National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA), and many Tribal governments routinely include environmental considerations in their local decision making process.

This course uses the HUD (24 CFR 58) environmental process that delegates NEPA & other environmental authorities to the Tribes as a framework for providing insights into issue identification and analysis pointed to consideration of alternatives. The textbook with companion DVD will use interactive exercises and simulation. Case oriented exercises will provide participants with a simulated hands-on experience as well as provide opportunities for Q & A and peer-to-peer education.
