SeSequential Pacific Biodiesel Acquires Bently Biofuels

[SeSequential Pacific Biodiesel](#) announced it has acquired Bently Biofuels' cooking oil collection and biodiesel production assets in Richmond, California, and Minden, Nevada. This acquisition marks an important first step for SeSequential in expanding its community scale biodiesel production business beyond the Pacific Northwest.

Founded in 2005, SeSequential Pacific Biodiesel is the longest-running commercial biodiesel producer in the Pacific Northwest. The company collects used cooking oil from thousands of restaurants, businesses, hospitals and schools and recycles it into cleaner burning, sustainably produced biodiesel fuel at its state of the art production facility in Salem, Oregon. SeSequential also supplies biodiesel to fleets, retailers and wholesale distributors up and down the West Coast. To date, the company has sold more than 20 million gallons of fuel.

"We believe strongly in the concept of community scale biodiesel production, where fuel is sourced, produced and sold within the same geographic region," said Tyson Keever, president of SeSequential Pacific Biodiesel. "We've been looking at ways to expand our operations into California and Nevada for a while now, but didn't want to stray too far from that community based model. This acquisition provides us with the infrastructure to replicate that model for the larger market."

SeSequential plans to maintain biodiesel sales and the collection services previously offered by Bently Biofuels in both states.

The [Greening Sports Directory](#) is a comprehensive directory of local, regional, and national contacts and resources to help sports facilities green their operations.



The school was overcrowded just then. She was there, Lorna saw the army bring in all these cots for lots of new kids who showed up from all over the country. They must have just wanted to get rid of all the extra hungry mouths; it was wartime and everything was rationed. One day those new kids were in the dorms, then they were all taken out, and were never seen again.

A probable site of this mass burial of the executed children has been located, and is now under the protection



Be descriptive and call out your accomplishments

Don't be shy when it comes to describing your accomplishments. We often come across applications where the applicant has worked on an amazing project or has great leadership experience, yet barely mentions this in their application! While we evaluate an applicant on all components of the application (i.e., resume, references, transcript, and essays), we want to know what's important to you, and we encourage you to call out the accomplishments that you are proud of.



The essays matter

The essays help us to get to know you better and they hold a lot of weight in the review process. We read through many applications and what we remember most is the quality of the essays. Read the questions carefully and answer each component of the question, as they're designed to help us evaluate your application based on the criteria we look for. Trust us, someone who has put a lot of time and effort into their essay questions stands out above the rest!

Proofread

Though this may sound simple, you may be surprised at the number of grammatical and spelling errors that we find in our application pool. You wouldn't be ruled out for a typo, but a well-polished application does say something about the effort you put in filling it out.

Be mindful of deadlines--both for yourself and for your references

Don't miss out just because the deadline slipped your mind! Mark your calendars and be sure to submit your application on time. Likewise, give your references ample time to write a

recommendation and remind them about the approaching deadline to ensure your application is complete.

Climate Change

Nearly 1,000 high-altitude lakes have been formed in Peru over the past 40 years as [the country's glaciers have melted 40 percent](#), *Reuters* reported. The glaciers are the source of much of the drinking water in Peru but are disappearing due to climate change, the Peruvian government said.

[Declining Arctic sea ice is behind a 7-degree increase in average October temperatures](#) in Barrow, Alaska, over the past 34 years, according to scientists at the University of Alaska Fairbanks, *Climate News Network* reported. The study also found that fluctuating sea ice levels are likely linked to the uneven temperature changes in Barrow, where the average annual temperature has risen 2.7 degrees.

Pacific islanders joined a flotilla of protesters in Australia who [blocked coal ships at Newcastle Port to demonstrate against Australia's commitment to coal](#), the *Guardian* reported. The islanders wanted to bring attention to climate change, which is driving the rising sea levels that threaten their countries with floods and saltwater intrusion.

An editor with multiple graduate degrees once called me up with a story idea hatched among fellow trend-sniffers in Manhattan. “Indians,” he said, with practiced urgency. “Something’s going on with American Indians. Look into it and tell me what you think.”

Dutifully, I reported back that the first Americans were still poor, still forgotten, still there — albeit with casinos and better lobbyists in Washington. The forgotten part applies especially at elections, given that natives who list themselves as “Indian alone” on the census form make up less than 1 percent of the total population of the United States.

But — news alert! — with barely two weeks to go until the midterm federal election, the most underrepresented people in the country could be the kingmakers for control of the Senate. Let us pause for the cynical voice of an Indian friend who thinks that elections don’t matter: “Democrats, Republicans, they’re all white to me,” he says.

Still, the fact that all the money and manipulations of the Koch brothers could be undone by a handful of native voters living in some of the poorest and most remote parts of the land is a tribute to our teetering democracy. More time has been wasted defending the name of the Washington Professional Football Team than has ever been spent discussing tribal sovereignty or how the modern diet is killing too many natives. Yet now, important-sounding people have been forced to learn a phrase in Yup’ik, or find Shannon County, S.D., on a map.

The Senate, by design, is unrepresentative. Why should Wyoming have as many senators as California, which has more than 60 times the population? That design also means that people in crowded states occasionally have to feign concern for residents in wide-open spaces.

Thus we find ourselves in Alaska and South Dakota, where the native vote could be the only thing that stands in the way of a Republican-controlled Senate. Alaska voters, though quirky and contrarian no matter what the race, seem poised to give the Republican Dan Sullivan the seat now held by the Democrat Mark Begich. Except typically, the polls are more misleading in the Last Frontier than a fish finder’s sonar in a bathtub.

Only about 250,000 people are expected to vote there. Of those, almost one in five has some Alaska Native or Indian blood — the highest percentage of any state. Begich has been feverishly working native villages in advance of the state’s two weeks of early voting. If the race is a nail-biter, look for late returns from, say, Kotzebue, an Inupiat town on a gravel spit 33 miles north of the Arctic Circle, to decide the winner.

In South Dakota, Native Americans are the largest single minority group, and they tend to vote Democratic. In a three-way race, heavy turnout on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation might be enough to prevent the fading Republican front-runner, Mike Rounds, from picking up the seat. Tribal elections are the same day, as is a ballot measure to change the name of Shannon County, which is more than 90 percent Indian, to Oglala Lakota County. In 2012, the tribes of North

Dakota provided the winning margin for the Democrat Heidi Heitkamp, who won her Senate seat by just over 4,000 votes.

What no vote can change are the woeful conditions in many parts of Indian country. Suicide, substance abuse and chronic unemployment are the scourges of many tribal homelands. Half the people in Shannon County live below the poverty level.

Depressing, yes. So what we talk about when we talk about Indians seldom gets beyond caricature. On the left, measures like Seattle's new designation of the second Monday in October as Indigenous Peoples' Day is the kind of empty, feel-good measure that sets up a comically liberal city council for mockery. It's not a real holiday, just enough of one to insult Italian-Americans who feel slighted at the dis of Christopher Columbus.

On the right, there is a hysterical fear of granting Indians any real power. So the Violence Against Women Act almost didn't make it through renewal last year because Republicans didn't want to allow tribes to prosecute non-Indians who assaulted Indians in Indian country.

Obamacare is a pundit's punching bag in much of the country. But on reservations, it has made a life-or-death difference for thousands of people whose health has been improved by some of the law's lesser-known provisions.

At the center of most questions in the native world is a construct that Americans often forget or ignore: nations within a nation. Tribes point to their treaties that grant a degree of sovereignty, signed by long-dead presidents, backed by Supreme Court decisions. If they can get a politician to understand that at election time, it's a minor victory.
