Support for Creative Climate Change Initiatives

Robert Rauschenberg Foundation: Climate Change Solutions Fund

The Robert Rauschenberg Foundation fosters the legacy of the artist's life, work, and philosophy that art can change the world. The Foundation's Climate Change Solutions Fund supports nonprofit organizations tackling the root causes of global warming in ways that both engage a broad public and recognize the catalytic roles culture and creativity can play in these endeavors. The purpose of the grant is to provide resources for organizations working to either mitigate the causes of climate change or adapt to the new physical and social environments it generates. Professional Development Fellowships for Teachers

Fund for Teachers

The Fund for Teachers awards fellowships to pre-K-12 classroom teachers throughout the United States so that they may participate in training and enriching activities that will improve their skills as teachers. Educators should propose a summer activity and explain how the endeavor will make the applicant a better teacher, how the applicant will implement his or her new improved skills in the classroom, and how these improved skills will benefit students, curricula, and the school. Teachers must have a minimum of three years experience and be full-time teachers spending at least 50% of their time in the classroom. Eligible teachers may apply as individuals (funding limit of \$5,000) or as a team (funding limit of \$10,000). The application deadline is January 29, 2015. Call for Artists

The city of Las Vegas Arts Commission has issued a national request for qualifications from artists who are interested in designing, fabricating and installing art benches along Main Street in downtown Las Vegas. The project artist will be selected by a panel of arts professionals, city staff and neighborhood stakeholders. More information can be found on the city's [website](#).

Approximately \$67,500, for 15 art benches, has been set aside for the first phase of this project, from Bonneville Avenue to Stewart Avenue. The entire project will stretch from Stewart to Sahara. The city has also set aside \$100,000 for a signature artwork at Main Street and Commerce. There will be a call to artists for this project as well.

The art projects are part of the city's Main Street/Commerce beautification project now under construction, which includes adding bike lanes and trees, and widening sidewalks. The beautification project also will feature artwork by local and national artists, with the first art component to be the artist-designed benches.

Nevada Rock Art Foundation granted \$7,000

Funding will support the volunteer-driven documentation and assessment of the Crow's Nest Petroglyph site, one of the largest rock art sites within the High Basins Area of Critical of Environmental Concern (ACEC). The Crow's Nest site contains 200-300 petroglyph panels, and is located just to the northeast of the Sparks Golden Eagle Regional Park. The site's proximity to



Sparks' ever-expanding population puts it, as well as the ~200 other petroglyph sites within the ACEC, at significant risk of vandalism, theft, and destruction. Recording the site will document its characteristics for posterity, and provide local community members with the uncommon opportunity to work on a professional archaeological project, to gain knowledge, and to ideally become stewards of Nevada's rock art heritage.
