

from *Lives in Ruins* by Marilyn Johnson. There are three hundred and sixty-nine human "bog bodies" that have been excavated around the world. They are highly preserved remains found in peat bogs or the like, and some are thousands of years old:

"In the National Museum of Ireland, ... behind the main room of the museum [is] a cache of human bodies, hundreds and sometimes thousands of years old, strangely preserved by the oxygen-deprived bog waters: Instead of the flesh decaying to leave skeletons, the bones of these bog bodies dissolved, leaving behind flesh, organs, and even hair -- natural mummies. ... [For example,] Clonycavan Man [is] a little skinny guy with a wispy goatee and a face shriveled to dark leather. His hair was piled atop his head like a prom queen's, pomaded with an ointment made from ingredients produced by a tree that grew only near the Mediterranean, more than a thousand miles away from where he lived and died.

Clonycavan man

"Old Croghan Man, the big guy ... would have been over six feet tall when he walked the Earth more than two thousand years ago. His torso, stained dark brown, looked almost maroon in the dim light. His hands were so perfectly cured that scientists had been able to lift fingerprints. Eight of his ten nails had been recovered. He had been beheaded. Big holes had been cut through the fleshy part of his upper arms and threaded with 'withy,' a cord made of willow, so he could be anchored in the bog by his killers. Also, his nipples had been sliced off. (It seems there was a custom in Ireland at this time of showing obeisance to your king by sucking his nipples. No nipples, you could not be a king.)

Old Croghan Man

"The archaeologists and curators speculated that Old Croghan and Clonycavan had been former kings or chiefs, or potential rulers who threatened those in power, or highborn sacrifices who had been taken to the edge of the kingdom and put to death with such vehemence it seemed ritualistic. ...

"Clonycavan and Old Croghan were discovered by chance in 2003, within months and about twenty-five miles of each other, when both were dredged up and damaged by peat-cutting machinery. ... Clonycavan and Old Croghan underwent postmortem torture to rival their mortem torture -- digital and laser imaging of every sort, infrared, ultraviolet, and regular X-ray analysis, 3-D facial reconstruction, pollen analysis, and gut, stomach, dental, and dermatological workups. Someone figured out what kind of wood was used to make Clonycavan's withy; another identified the species that had contributed the leather of Old Croghan's cuff. ...

Tollund Man

"While still an undergraduate, [Heather Gill-Frerking] had seen a picture of the head of Tollund Man, whose remains had been found in a bog in Denmark. A 2,000-year-old man (or perhaps a bit older), Tollund Man, like other bog bodies, appeared in a state the reverse of most corpses: although his skeleton was dissolving, his body tissue remained, stained brown but otherwise in remarkable condition. You could see the stubble on his chin and his puckered forehead. His expression was peaceful, in spite of the braided leather rope around his neck. ...

"Her Ph.D. thesis about the Iron Age bog bodies of Schleswig, Germany, resulted in the news that the body known as Windeby Girl (immortalized in a poem by Seamus Heaney) had in fact been a boy. ... [There is] a site in Florida where a pond with a peat bottom preserved numerous bodies -- no tissue or organs, but skeletons and, surprisingly, intact brains. 'There are only three hundred sixty-nine bog bodies. That's a very small pool of evidence,' she pointed out. Some are in private hands. 'You'd be amazed how many people want a mummy.'

"I assumed there would be a lot of excavations in bogs, but Gill-Frerking disabused me of this. You'd have to drain the bogs to do a proper excavation -- too expensive and too difficult. 'These bog bodies are found by accident by the peat machines, which do a lot of damage,' she said. 'Bogs are wonderful places to bury bodies, or for accidents to happen. A sheep falls in, and a shepherd goes after it and falls in too -- it's not officially quicksand, but it acts like it.'"



Facts on Honey and Cinnamon:

It is found that a mix of honey and cinnamon cures most diseases. Honey is produced in most of the countries of the world. PIMPLES: Three tablespoons of honey and one teaspoon of cinnamon powder paste. Apply this paste on the pimples before sleeping and wash it off the next morning with warm water. When done daily for two weeks, it removes all pimples from the root.

SKIN INFECTIONS: Applying honey and cinnamon powder in equal parts on the affected parts cures eczema, ringworm and all types of skin Infections.

WEIGHT LOSS: Daily in the morning one half hour before breakfast and on an empty stomach, and at night before sleeping, drink honey and cinnamon powder boiled in one cup of water. When taken regularly, it reduces the weight of even the most obese person. Defense Authorization Provisions Affecting Tribal Seeds Lands Passes U.S. House of Representatives

U.S. Senate Expected to Take Action on House Passed Defense Bill Before the End of the Session

On December 4, 2014, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2015 (NDAA) by a vote of 300 in favor, 119 opposed. The FY 2015 spending agreement authorizes nearly \$577 billion in defense spending for the Department of Defense, Pentagon, and national security programs under the Department of Energy. Additionally, there were nearly 100 land bills attached to the NDAA authorization, which included 19 federal land conveyances and nine with tribal implications. The bill heads over to the Senate for consideration. NCAI encourages tribes to contact their Senators with regard to the following specific provisions.

Provisions Included in NDAA with Tribal Implications

NCAI - National Congress of Indians Action Alert

Below is a list of the nine NDAA Sections with tribal implications, and referenced below are a number of NCAI standing Resolutions that are either in support of, or in opposition to said sections.

Section 3001. Land Conveyance, Wainwright, Alaska

•Authorizes the Department of the Interior to sell 1,518 acres of land to the Olgoonik Alaska Native Corporation. The land authorized for sale is known as the Wainwright Distant Early Warning line site located within the Naval Petroleum Reserve. The Olgoonik Alaska Native Corporation owns lands surrounding the site and has been working with the Air Force with contamination clean-up efforts.

Section 3002. Sealaska Land Entitlement Finalization

*Transfers over 70,000 acres of land to the Sealaska Native Corporation, settling historic land entitlements for this Alaska Native Corporation under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.

NCAI Resolution #ABQ-03-001 "Support for Finalization of All ANSCA Land Entitlement and Land Conveyances"

Section 3003. Southeast Arizona Land Exchange and Conservation

Authorizes the transfer of transfer of 2,400 acres of U.S. Forest Service land in southeast Arizona to Resolution Copper, a subsidiary of a foreign mining company. Included in the transferto Mining Interests with Sacred and Cultural Significance to Tribes, including H.R. 687 and S. 339"

Section 3009. Northern Nevada Land Conveyances

•Subsection (f) authorizes 373 acres of land administered by the Bureau of Land Management to be put in trust for the Te-Moak Indian Tribe of Western Shoshone Indians of Nevada. Once these lands become part of the Te-Moak Reservation they can only be used for traditional and customary uses, stewardship conservation, and residential or recreational development. The development of gaming enterprises will not be permitted.

Section 3021. Bureau of Land Management Permit Processing

•Authorizes the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to charge a \$9,500 fee for applications to new oil and gas permits in FY 2016. These fees would be indexed to inflation each year until FY 2026. Proceeds will be distributed to field offices and used for the processing of leases and permits, and the BLM Permit Processing Improvement Fund. The BLM Permit Processing Fund is divided into two accounts-a rental account and a fee account-which will be used in coordinating and processing oil and gas use authorizations on onshore federal and Indian trust mineral estate lands. NCAI and tribes have for many years opposed the application of BLM permit fees to tribal lands.

Section 3077. Land Taken into Trust for Benefit of the Northern Cheyenne Tribe

*Requires the Department of the Interior to take 932 acres of tribal fee lands into trust for the Northern Cheyenne Tribe in Montana. No later than 60 days after the tribe submits a revenue sharing agreement to the Secretary of the Interiof, Great Northern Properties will convey to the tribe all rights and title to coal, iron, and ore mineral interests underlying the Northern Cheyenne Tribe Reservation in exchange for the tribe's mineral interest in off-reservation lands. The Secretary of the Interior will also consult with tribe o prepare land consolidation and fractionation reports, and transfer of the Northern Cheyenne Trust Fund to the tribe will also be processed no later than 30 days after passage.

Authorizes the transfer of nearly 1,500 acres of land within the former Badger Army Ammunition Plant to the Department of the Interior to be held in trust for the Ho-Chunk Nation.

NCAI #LNK-12-033 "Support for Bureau of Indian Affairs Acceptance of Excess Federal Properties for Indian Tribes"

Section 3081. Ensuring Public Access to the Summit of Rattlesnake Mountain in the Hanford Reach National Monument

- •Instructs the Department of the Interior to provide public access to Rattlesnake Mountain for recreational, historical, scientific, educational, and cultural purposes. Rattlesnake Mountain is a sacred mountain to the Yakama people of Washington State, who have consistently opposed measures to enable public access to the 3,600-foot summit.
- •NCAI Resolution #ATL-14-033, "For the United States, Including the Federal Agency Managing Hanford Nuclear Reservation, to Recognize a Revisionary Interest or a First Right of Refusal Vested in Tribes when the Federal Government Seeks to Sell or Convey Title to Indigenous Lands It Holds"
