California to be at 50% Renewable Energy by 2030 By John Addison In addition to meeting traditional electricity needs for homes and buildings, demand for electricity is growing with increased population, economic growth, water pumping, recycling and desalination, and millions traveling in electric cars, buses and rail. Although California has only 13 percent of the nation's population, it has half the nation's solar power, half the grid storage, and half the electric vehicles. California is on track to use 50 percent renewables in 12 years. Today, California is coal free and nuke free, generating 40 percent of electricity from solar, wind, geothermal, and hydropower. Wind and solar power are being added, often for less than four cents per kilowatt-hour. Renewables, energy efficiency, energy storage, microgrids, and software are enablers of the transition from fossil fuels to clean energy. <u>Continue Reading</u>

Thanks to global warming, Antarctica is starting to turn green

A vital message has risen up from the Grand Canal in Venice. Two, 5,000 pound hands appear to be gripping the walls of the historic Ca' Sagredo Hotel echoing the <u>warning</u> of experts that say "The Floating City" could sink in as little as 100 years.

Internationally renowned Italian artist Lorenzo Quinn <u>unveiled</u> his new sculpture, *Support*, to serve as a call to "protect our planet" and "our national heritage sites."

"Venice is a floating art city that has inspired cultures for centuries, but to continue to do so it needs the support of our generation and future ones, because it is threatened by <u>climate change</u> and time decay," Quinn said.

Experts say Venice and much of Italy's Adriatic coastline is at risk of disappearing from <u>sea level</u> rise. According to scientists from Italy and France, the Mediterranean will rise by up to five feet (140cm) before 2100, putting Venice and many other areas at risk.

The sculpture is in the shape of two childlike hands, modeled after his son's hands. Quinn hopes his installation will "speak to the people in a clear, simple and direct way through the innocent hands of a child" and send a powerful message that "united we can make a stand to curb climate change."

Quinn explained that he used hands to "symbolize tools that can both destroy the world, but also have the capacity to save it." The hands appear to be holding up the building, which draws

attention to the fragile nature of the infrastructure and the impact climate change can have on the city.

Support was unveiled on May 13 and will be on view until Nov. 26.

Residents Sue to Block 3.6 Million Pounds of Highly Radioactive Nuclear Waste From Being Stored Near California Beach

Environmental activists in California are fighting plans to store 3.6 million pounds of highly radioactive <u>nuclear</u> waste on a popular beach in San Diego County.

In 2012, a <u>radioactive leak</u> at the San Onofre nuclear power plant forced an emergency shutdown. The plant was fully closed by June 2013. Now residents are fighting the permit issued by the California Coastal Commission to store the millions of pounds of nuclear waste in thin, stainless steel canisters, within 100 feet of the ocean.

We speak to Ray Lutz, founder of <u>Citizens' Oversight</u>, which has filed a lawsuit challenging the expansion of the nuclear waste storage facility.
