We offered prayer at The Last Hole along Antelope Creek tonight. This site got its name because, after days of running, 21 Cheyenne (mostly kids) hid here. US soldiers approached from three directions and there was nowhere for them to run so they piled on one another, placing the youngest children closest to the ground in attempts to protect them. The soldiers could've approached, recaptured them, and taken them back to the fort but they didn't. All of those



who hid here were summarily executed, shot at point-blank range. There were kids as young as 8, 5 and 2yrs old.

Dirt was carelessly thrown over their bodies. Days later they were dug up and eventually taken to the Smithsonian in Washington DC so their remains could be studied to see how well the Army's guns worked on bones and skulls at close range.

After the Native American Graves and Repatriation Act was passed in 1990, Cheyenne leadership fought to bring them home. They returned in 1993. Our Run ends at their gravesite in Busby, MT. The rancher who now owns this land, Andy Federle, reported hearing children's screams and cries across this land at night. Years and years ago, Phillip Whiteman Jr and Lee Lonebear visited the rancher and asked to visit the site to offer prayer.

This working relationship allows for the Runners to visit The Last Hole every year to offer prayers to those spirits. Now, Mr. Federle reports hearing sounds of play and laughter.

Our prayers are strong. They bring healing, for both spirits in this world and the other world. This Run is an act of resilience and hope.

This fellowship offers an extraordinary experience in entrepreneurship, paired with a rigorous training program from the Center for Green Schools and its partners in the green schools movement. Green Schools Fellows are individuals who understand the patience and persistence that is required to be a change agent in a complex organization.

The fellow will be selected based on the qualifications outlined in the job description, the person's ability to fit well within the culture of the school district and their ability to make a five-year commitment to the district. Applications are due **Mon., February 5 at 6 p.m. EST.**

#### **Responsibilities of the fellow**

The Hawaii Green Schools Fellow will work directly with the Hawaii DOE in Honolulu to initiate and/or accelerate initiatives to make their schools healthier, more sustainable learning environments. Working across the district and with various community partners, the fellow will also support campuses to expand environmental and sustainability literacy opportunities and ensure a culture of sustainability at all levels of the organization.

The fellow will be trained and coached by the Center for Green Schools and jointly overseen by WRNS Studio and the Hawaii DOE. Professional development support from the Center will include biweekly phone meetings, in-person intensive training and attendance at annual conferences such as <u>Greenbuild</u> and the <u>Green Schools Conference and Expo</u>.

#### The fellowship program

In an effort to effectively and rapidly transform the environments in which our children learn, the Center for Green Schools officially launched the Green Schools Fellowship program in 2011, after a two-year pilot with the Recovery School District in New Orleans. This program has been successful in bringing green practices to school systems that want to make the case, through proven results, for staff capacity to address sustainability.

Staff positions have been established and retained in New Orleans, Sacramento, Boston and Grand Rapids. Placing and supporting sustainability staff in school districts impacts entire communities with the message that a healthy and vibrant future is central to the education and future success of our children, and the way we design, build and operate schools is crucial to this future.

This course will touch on those special rules and laws in what is commonly known as conveyances. To convey is to transfer property properly to make it valid in the eyes of the law.
