Support for Employment Initiatives to Assist People with Disabilities

Kessler Foundation: Signature Employment Grants

The Kessler Foundation's Signature Employment Grants provide support for non-traditional solutions that increase employment outcomes for individuals with disabilities. Grants ranging from \$100,000 to \$250,000 per year for up to two years are awarded nationally to fund pilot initiatives, demonstration projects, or social ventures that lead to the generation of new ideas to solve the high unemployment and underemployment of people with disabilities (PWD). A Tale of Two Archivists

Many people have strong reactions when they think about Yucca Mountain and a particular Senator from Nevada named Harry Reid. What most people don't realize is two librarians from University Libraries at the University of Nevada, Reno are hard at work archiving, processing and cataloging the thousands of documents and digital assets contained in these two very unique, very large and very "Nevada" collections.

This photo from December 17, 1986 highlights Senator-Elect Harry Reid, left, showing Department of Energy Secretary John Herrington his anti-repository letter to the President of the United States. The letter, initiated in July, 1986, opposes the location of a high-level nuclear waste repository in Nevada. Reid told the Secretary that Nevadans are patriotic and support a strong national defense, "but we've done more than our fair share." More than 33,000 Nevadans had signed the letter, which confirms they are "unalterably opposed to the disposal of any high-level nuclear waste in Nevada, now or in the future, under any circumstances." As Herrington looked at the letter and a sample of the signatures, Reid stands next to a pile of the signature sheets on his desk.
