Support to Create Healthier Communities in the Contiguous U.S.

[Aetna Foundation: Cultivating Healthy Communities](#)

The Aetna Foundation is dedicated to promoting wellness, health, and access to high-quality

healthcare for everyone. The Foundation's Cultivating Healthy Communities grant program is intended to help local communities in the contiguous United States to become healthier places to live, with emphasis on projects that benefit underserved, low-income, and minority communities. Grants are provided to nonprofit organizations, government agencies, and federally recognized Indian tribes committed to improving the health of their participants by focusing on activities that align with at least one of the following five domains: Healthy Behaviors, Community Safety, Built Environment, Social/Economic Factors, and Environmental Exposures. Applicants can request from \$50,000 to \$100,000 for projects lasting between 18 and 24 months. Organizations with annual operating budgets below \$250,000 are not eligible to apply. The Stage 1 application deadline is April 18, 2018; Stage 2 applications are due June 15, 2018. Visit the Foundation's website to download the request for proposals.

Environmental Activist Groups Funded

Patagonia Corporate Grants Program

The Patagonia Corporate Grants Program provides support to small, grassroots organizations with provocative direct-action agendas that are working on multi-pronged campaigns to protect the environment in the United States. (Grants are also provided to 21 countries, including Canada, through the International Grants Program.) The focus is on activist groups that are dedicated to protecting local habitats throughout the country. The company is most interested in supporting organizations that work on the root causes of problems and that approach issues with a commitment to long-term change. Grants typically range from \$10,000 to \$20,000. The application deadlines are April 30 and August 31, 2018. Visit the Patagonia website to review the program's grant guidelines.

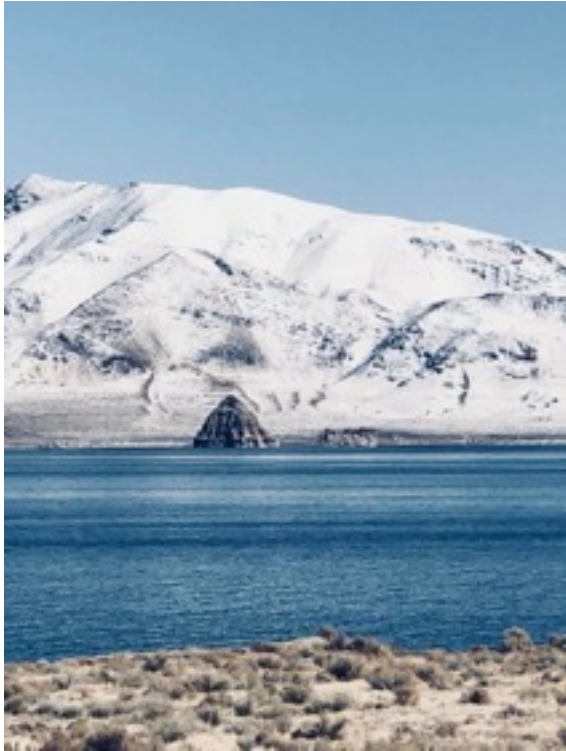
