The American Academy of Pediatrics suggest for children younger than 18 months to avoid use of screen media other than video-chatting. Parents of children 18-24 months of age who want to introduce digital media should choose high quality programming, and watch it with their children to help them understand what they're seeing. For children ages 2-5 years, one hour of technology use is appropriate per day, inclusive of time spent at home and in early learning settings and across devices. Camp Fortunate Monument near Armstead, Montana. The first white

men in the Red Rock Valley were members of the Lewis and Clark Expedition. In August, 1805, they camped for one week at a spot, on the east side of the river, which became known as Camp Fortunate. Sacajawea and Chief Cameahwait of the Shoshone Indian tribe recognized each other

as brother and sister. Here, they were able to get horses to cross the divide to the west, making this camp a pivotal point to the success of the Lewis and Clark Expedition. The plaque was written by Armstead local historian Laura Tolman Scott.
