Cal Poly researcher looks back at California's mega-drought By Richard Gearhart, KSBY, 2/18/19

Drought has long been a part of California's history. There is archeologic evidence that shows periods of below-normal rainfall have lasted for more than 50 years in the past. A Cal Poly professor is looking back at those so-called mega-droughts to see what we might be able to learn about the area's climate in the future. Archaeology professor Terry Jones has been looking into California's climate for most of his career. He found evidence of a 50-plus year mega-drought in our area 800 years ago that forced a change in the culture of native Central Coast residents. They responded to the incredibly dry conditions by turning away from land and to the ocean for food.

Gov. Sisolak Encourages Young Women to Learn Cybersecurity

Governor Steve Sisolak has announced a partnership with the SANS Institute to launch Girls Go Cyberstart and Cyber FastTrack in Nevada. The SANS Institute was established in 1989 as a cooperative research and education organization. Its programs reach more than 165,000 security professionals around the world.

The initiative gives young women in high school and college an opportunity to learn cybersecurity skills, discover their cyber talents, and explore a career in the field. The three Nevada high schools with the most participants will win awards of \$1,000, \$750 and \$500, respectively. At least 10 high school girls will each get \$500 scholarships to help them pay for college.

"I am committed to ensuring that all young women across Nevada have access to the education and experiences that will prepare them for exciting careers in STEM fields," said Governor Sisolak. You can read more here.

The Supreme Court is taking up another far-reaching debate over the scope of the Clean Water Act. The justices this morning agreed to hear County of Maui, Hawaii v. Hawai'i Wildlife Fund, a case involving whether the law covers pollution that moves through groundwater before reaching a federal waterway.
