In the 2018 election, North Dakota passed laws explicitly disenfranchising its Native American residents just before a competitive Senate election.

Now, similar laws are being considered all over the country--and it's up to us to stop them.

The United States has an ugly history of systematic discrimination and disenfranchisement. And these attacks on Native American voting rights are part of a larger campaign of attacks on voting rights for minorities that includes voter purges in Georgia and Florida, among others.

Non-traditional addresses for many reservation residents create registration problems. Additionally, even when registered, high unemployment, extremely distant polling locations (sometimes hundreds of miles), newly minted voter ID laws, and limited resources create acute disadvantages to Native American voting.

ADD YOUR NAME: Tell county and state election officials: Native Americans deserve equal access to voting.

These burdens work in tandem with historical, social, and political conditions to produce a discriminatory result for Native Americans.

It is the right of the American Indigenous people to have equal access to the election process. We believe establishing satellite locations for in-person voter registration and in-person early voting locations must happen for the Native American votes to be cast and counted.

Court limits landmark tribal groundwater case

A California court has sided with a Southern California water district in a high-stakes case with a Native American tribe over access to groundwater. The ruling follows a 2017 decision that found the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians had reserved water rights to groundwater under its lands. But federal Judge Jesus Bernal said the nearby Coachella Valley Water District and Desert Water Agency have not harmed the tribe with their groundwater pumping because the reservation has sufficient water for its needs. The tribe, Bernal wrote, has not shown it has suffered any sort of water shortage due to the district's management of the aquifer and thus does not have standing to bring its claims.

Ed was born in Winnebago, Nebraska in 1930. He made his way out west in the mid 1950's where he attended Oakland City College and received his credentials as a Diesel Mechanic. There he met his lifelong companion Dorothy. They were married and moved to "Little Nixon" Nevada, where he worked as a diesel mechanic while raising cattle and kids on their small ranch. Regarded as a master mechanic throughout Nevada and steeped in his native culture, he took great pride in passing his skills on to his kids, grandkids, and any kid who wanted to learn. He not only taught how to turn a wrench but also the traditional methods of drumming, singing, and dancing.

Fluently speaking his native-tongue Winnebago and well learned in his tribal culture, "Dad" told stories of growing up traditionally and being raised by his grandma Mary Greywolf. He loved to beat the drum with precision and sang with a skill scarcely matched. "Grampa," an authentic Indian cowboy storyteller now walks the streets of gold with his savior Jesus, undoubtably singing and telling stories. Viewing will take place at Walton's Ross, Burke & Knobel (2155 Kietzke Ln, Reno, Nev) Sunday from 1pm to 4pm. A private memorial will be held at a later date.
