New dam proposal in Sierra Nevada stirs debate over California energy policy By Kurtis Alexander, San Francisco Chronicle, 5/13/19

Up a remote canyon in the towering eastern Sierra, a Southern California company has an ambitious plan to dam the area's cold, rushing waters and build one of the state's first big hydroelectric facilities in decades. The project, southeast of Yosemite near the town of Bishop (Inyo County), faces long regulatory odds as well as daunting costs. But residents of the Owens Valley downstream and state environmentalists are not taking it lightly.

PacifiCorp and Tribes applaud selection of Kiewit By Herald and News, 5/10/19

PacifiCorp has entered into a site access agreement with Kiewit Infrastructure West Co. to allow the firm to conduct initial surveying and other work connected to planned removal of four dams on the Klamath River. The site access agreement follows an announcement by the Klamath River Renewal Corporation on April 25 that it had finalized and signed an initial contract with Kiewit to perform preliminary services that include design, planning and permitting support to carry out dam removal.

After the devastation wrought by the gold rush, the dawn of irrigation projects in the Klamath Basin inflicted a final lasting blow to the Salmon and Steelhead that depend on her free flowing waters for reproduction. Between the Klamath main-stem dam in Hornbrook, Dwinell Dam on the Shasta, and diversions that dewater and pollute both the Shasta and Scott, these fish have no place of cool water refuge to complete their life cycles. The healthy self-sustaining trout populations above Klamath main-stem dams offer a sure sign dam removal will provide access to miles of viable spawning and rearing habitat; if it works for trout it will work for salmon.

Toward safe and reliable drinking water for all Californians By Karly Chin, Stanford Earth, 5/10/19

California struggles to deliver safe drinking water to millions of residents. The challenges – often complex issues at the interface of human, legislative, technical, and geological dimensions resist easy answers. Stanford experts explored possible ways forward at a recent panel discussion in Sacramento. "We're tackling one of the most challenging but important issues of the 21st century," said Stanford Woods Institute for the Environment Director Chris Field, the event's moderator. Laying an effective foundation for water policy will require finding interconnected areas, according to keynote speaker Joaquin Esquivel, Chair of the California State Water Resources Control Board. "It's about democratizing and involving diverse perspectives, and Stanford is a platform to facilitate this framework," said Esquivel.

Colorado to make tough decisions when it comes to water usage in drought By Deepan Dutta, Summit Daily, 5/11/19 contingency plan

The water battle is over, but the war has just begun. At the 26th annual Summit County State of the River conference at the Silverthorne Pavilion this past Tuesday, the mood was light because of robust snowpack in the mountains and the recent approval of a drought contingency plan to lower water usage during critical shortages among states in the Lower Colorado River Basin — Nevada, Arizona and California. However, when it comes to water, consistency is preferred over short-term victories, and the West is still in the midst of a long-term water shortage in Lake

Powell and Lake Mead, primary reservoirs that serve 40 million people. For that reason, the Upper Basin states — Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and New Mexico — have to also come up with their own drought contingency plans.

Wheeler: Trump admin might 're-examine' climate scienceBy Jean Chemnick, E&E News, 5/10/19

EPA Administrator Andrew Wheeler used an overseas gathering of environment ministers this week to hint that the United States might overhaul the way it uses climate

data and modeling. Five days after his assertion was included in an official document from the Group of Seven meeting in Metz, France, it remains unclear if Wheeler revealed a potential policy to reexamine climate modeling.

One of my friends told me about a powerful lesson in her daughter's high school class this winter. They're learning about the Salem Witch Trials, and their teacher told them they were going to play a game.

The teens dove into grilling each other. One fairly large group formed, but most of the students broke into small, exclusive groups, turning away anyone they thought gave off even a hint of guilt.

"Okay," the teacher said. "You've got your groups. Time to find out which ones fail. All witches, please raise your hands."

No one raised a hand.

The kids were confused and told him he'd messed up the game.

"Did I? Was anyone in Salem an actual witch? Or did everyone just believe what they'd been told?"



May 11, 2019 - Washington -Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-Calif.) called on members of the California Senate Appropriations Committee to support SB 307, legislation introduced by California State Senator Richard Roth (D-Riverside) to protect the Mojave Desert from the harmful Cadiz Water Project. "The Cadiz water extraction proposal illustrates why state protections of desert groundwater basins are so critical at this time." Senator Feinstein wrote. "Cadiz, Inc., a private company that owns approximately 45,000 acres in the Mojave Desert, wants to exploit the aguifer underneath the land it owns and the adjacent desert. It proposes to extract these limited water resources at withdrawal rates that would decimate the aguifer, and in turn, the desert.

Perry confirms timetable to move plutonium from Nevada

Energy Secretary Rick Perry confirmed he'd agreed to a timetable to remove a half-metric ton of plutonium that was covertly shipped to Nevada.
