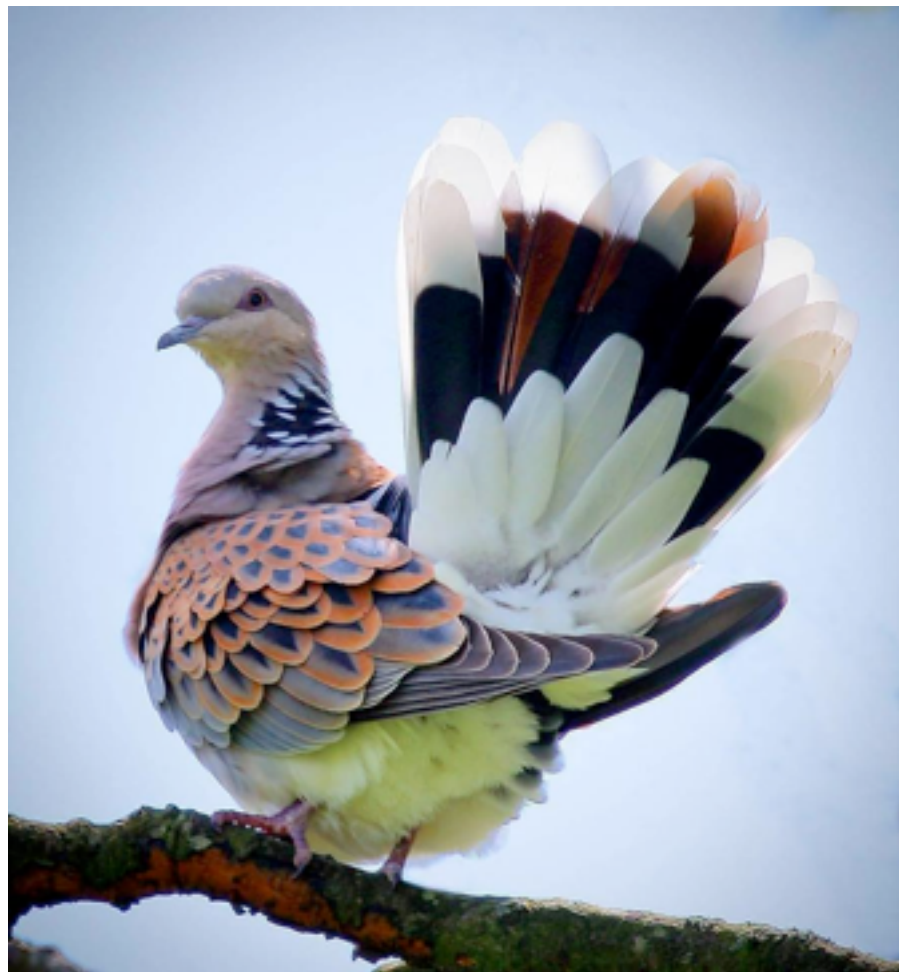

### **Canadian Heritage**

The Commemorate Canada program provides funding for initiatives that commemorate and celebrate historical figures, places, events, and accomplishments of national significance. Priority is given to commemorations and celebrations marking 25th, 50th, 75th, 100th anniversaries and subsequent anniversaries in increments of 25 years. Initiatives must

include a learning component and be of national interest and national or multi-regional in scope. Canadian nonprofit organizations, businesses, educational institutions, and government entities are eligible to apply. Applications may be submitted at any time. It is recommended to submit the application at least six months before the start of the project.

**[Water harvester makes it easy to quench your thirst in the desert](#)**                      **By Berkeley**

With water scarcity a growing problem worldwide, University of California, Berkeley, researchers are close to producing a microwave-sized water harvester that will allow you to pull all the water you need directly from the air — even in the hot, dry desert. In a paper appearing this week in *ACS Central Science*, a journal of the American Chemical Society, UC Berkeley's Omar Yaghi and his colleagues describe the latest version of their water harvester, which can pull more than five cups of water (1.3 liters) from low-humidity air per day for each kilogram (2.2 pounds) of water-absorbing material, a very porous substance called a metal-organic framework, or MOF. That is more than the minimum required to stay alive.

On this date in Genocidal US History: Please take a moment to remember the innocent indigenous lives lost to extreme brutality and racism on September 3-6, 1863 at present day at Whitestone Hill in SE North Dakota.

The **Whitestone Hill Massacre** saw the unnecessary murders of over 300 Yankton, Dakota, Hunkpapa and Sihasapa Lakota Men, Women, Elderly, Children, and BABIES by Brigadier General Alfred Sully. This unprovoked massacre was out of pure spite against the Dakota that had fled MN after the Dakota Conflict. The community was busy preparing for winter when the soldiers came upon them and were attacked and all properties destroyed, burned and stolen.

Atrocities of this battle is given by LaDonna Brave Bull Allard in this interview:

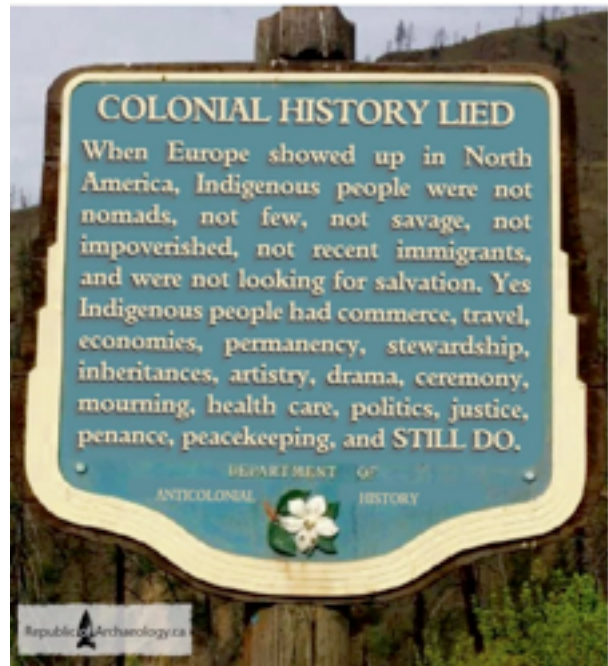

“Brave Bull Allard’s great-great-grandmother Grey Hand Woman, who was nine years old, was shot in the leg and spent the night crying for her mother. “Everywhere, she could hear the crying and screams, the songs of people dying,” Brave Bull Allard said. In the morning, soldiers threw her in the back of a buckboard wagon, sparing her life for some unknown reason.

‘She laid in the buckboard as she watched the soldiers come and start killing the dogs and the babies, killing the horses, killing the wounded. They gathered up all of our property—the tents, the meat, the hides, everything we own. And we had one section of soldiers sitting down there poking holes in the bottom of our pots. And they gathered all that, and they started this great big fire, burning all our food, our homes, everything. They said that there was so much buffalo meat that they burned, that tallow ran down like rivers out into the creeks. And the people ran. For three to four days they ran, as the soldiers continued to chase and kill them.’ - LaDonna Brave Bull Allard

Today the site is part of ND’s State Historical Society and is towered by a memorial for the 20 US Calvary soldiers who were killed mostly by friendly fire. The site is still referred to as a “battle” today.

Two extremely rare circulars printing proclamations by President Roosevelt establishing National Forests in Nevada. Ruby Mountains Forest Reserve (1906) encompassed more than 420,000 acres in northeastern Nevada, and Vegas National Forest (1907) some 185,000 acres in Lincoln County. An unrecorded edition of the superb Henry Tanner map of North America, issued in 1845 as President Polk was bringing disputes over Oregon and Texas to a boil. Setting its prime meridian at Washington, D.C., the map depicts North America in its entirety, with much attention given to the continent's river systems and topography. ***World at One View*** is centered on a double-hemisphere world map, whose most interesting feature is a projected trans-continental railroad from New York to Astoria, Oregon. The map is surrounded by a riot of imagery, including a "Panoramic View of the Route to China, by the Oregon Railroad and the Pacific Ocean;" a display of "female costumes" from around the world; another display of the world's great buildings; informational charts; a vignette of a waterspout; and corner portraits of a "Caucasian," "Mongul," "Malay" and "African." From between the hemispheres a native American warrior emerges and waves his axe, though it's impossible to say whether he is intended to be enthusiastic or threatening. The metal cut frame adds further decorative value, though it's hardly necessary.

**Planning Grants** (awards of up to \$1,000) - Rolling deadline.


