



## Historical Nevada Collections: Part II

Digital Copies of original manuscripts, photos, and records

### • [Adjutant General of Nevada Reports 1865 - 1931](#)

Reports contain muster rolls of all men enlisted in Nevada Militia and Nevada National Guard from 1864 to 1930. Also includes updates on military actions and correspondences and an accounting of funds, arms, ammunition and supplies.

### • [First Constitutional Convention - 1863](#)

Minutes of the first Nevada Constitutional Convention which took place from November 3, 1863 - December 12, 1863

- [Indigent Insane & Hospital for Mental Disease 1871 - 1931](#)

Biennial Reports including lists of names of those admitted for care, treatment methods used, farm industry production, status of physical infrastructure. and other assorted topics.

- [Nevada Historical Society Quarterly](#)

Newsletters from 1957 to 2009 which contain scholarly articles about Nevada History and other general interest topics.

- [Nevada Mining Reports 1893 - 1931](#)

Includes Biennial Reports of the Inspector of Mines 1909 to 1930, Virginia City School of Mines reports, 1893 State Mining Laboratory Report 1893, 1921 Ore Samplers report and 1929 Bulletin from the Mackay School of Mines.

- [Nevada Orphanages & Reformatories 1871 - 1930](#)

Reports made to the legislature by the Nevada State Orphanage, Florence Crittenton Mission and the Nevada School of Industry. The Name, age, and nativity of children in the orphanage are listed.

## [Nevada State Land Patents](#)

Transfer of land ownership from the State of Nevada to individuals from 1865 to 2013 is recorded in these land patents. Information includes when ownership was transferred, name of the buyer, a legal description of the land, date of sale, and any easements.

Reports by the State Prison Warden include details of prison industries and names

of prisoners admitted, released, and pardoned. Reports from the State Police are also included.

In the middle of July, I was surprised to find myself trudging through a couple feet of snow while hiking south of Lake Tahoe. In 2012, California became the first state in the country to declare that “Every human being has the right to safe, clean, affordable and accessible water” when the state legislature inserted that statement into its state water code. Now, a new UCLA study finds, the state may be making progress on turning that goal into a reality. “From the start, the challenge was to meet the needs of some one million Californians who lacked access to clean, safe, reliable drinking water,” says Jon Christensen, the author of the study. “Their tap water was — and largely remains — contaminated by nitrates from agricultural pollution, perchlorate from industrial pollution and other toxics such as arsenic.


