

Nevada Receives Grant For Women's History Project

The Nevada State Historic Preservation Office has received nearly \$50,000 to launch a women's history project spotlighting women's rights and achievements throughout the state, specifically surrounding the push for women to get the vote.

The grant was part of the National Park Service's Underrepresented Communities Grant. Nevada was the only state to receive the grant.

Over the next year, <u>NSHPO</u> will help complete the Nevada Women's Cultural Resource Analyses with the funds from the grant.

Rebecca Palmer with the preservation office explained that the project will focus on creating a historic context, which is used to identify properties that could be nominated for the National Register for Historic Places.

"This grant will give women a presence in existing national register listings and it will also afford us the opportunity to identify new properties that could be listed in the national register because of their association with the women's suffrage movement or the equal rights movement of the 1970s," Palmer explained.

She said the historic context will be constructed using existing sources like existing historic places, scholarly works and the Nevada Women's History Project, which has already done work on the women's suffrage movement in the state.

"The point of a historic context is to really enliven the information we already have about historic buildings," she said.

Palmer gave an example of the Las Vegas Grammar school, which was used by the Mesquite Club. The Mesquite Club was started in 1911 by civic-minded women in Southern Nevada who worked to improve the community and frequently held meetings about suffrage.

The community will get a chance to look through the preservation office's database and contribute their own information when the website page is up in running.

Palmer said the entire project is expected to be finished in two years.

*Ed note:* Since Native Americans were not citizens in 1920, Native women did not automatically get the vote......and the story diverges from there, depending on tribe, state, etc. My challenge to readers is for you to tell the story of women's vote in your community here in the Journal or by direct submission to the Project. If from another area, we will publish it as a reflection of they many ways we got to this time/space. Ask your grandma about her first voting experience. What was yours?

# FIVE HISTORIC MARKERS COMMEMORATE WOMAN SUFFRAGE ACTIVITIES IN NEVADA

The National Votes for Women Trail, a project of the National Collaborative for Women's History Sites, will include five sites for historic markers in the state of Nevada

The National Collaborative for Women's History Sites (NCWHS) and the William G. Pomeroy Foundation have partnered to place historic markers in each state and territory of the US. The markers recognize significant events and people in the suffrage campaign.

The historic markers project emerged from the National Votes for Women Trail, a project of the NCWHS. This digital site visualizes places and people who worked for woman suffrage from the middle of the 19th century through 1920. Nevada passed a woman suffrage bill in 1914 and active members of the state campaign went on to work for suffrage in other states and set up voter education groups in the state.

"It has been remarkable to discover the breadth and longevity of activity across the state that led to this win," said Joanne Goodwin, professor of history at UNLV and a Board member of the NCWHS, who coordinated the Nevada effort. "The National Collaborative for Women's History Sites and Pomeroy Foundation have demonstrated the truly national effort of the campaign." The project benefited from the research assistance of UNLV PhD student Christina Lamoureux. The entire application process working with local communities and the Pomeroy Foundation has taken two years.

The first installation of a suffrage marker takes place:

When: November 22, 2019 at 12:00 p.m.

Where: Tonopah, NV at the Mizpah Hotel

The historical marker will honor Marjorie Brown whose work with the state organization succeeded in gaining support in the middle of the state.

Other approved sites in Nevada are: (Dates and times are tenative)

1. Carson City - honoring Felice Cohn for her work with the state Equal Franchise Society and writing the draft of the legislation passed by the legislature. December 10, 2019 at 1:00 p.m., Nevada State Legislative Grounds.

2. Battle Mountain -- site of the first convention in 1870 to organize for woman suffrage in the

state. July 4, 2020.

3. Las Vegas -- the Mesquite , especially its President Delphine Squires who brought national and state suffrage speakers to the southern part of the state during the height of the campaign. March 5, 2020 at 10:00 a.m.

4. Reno -- the state headquarters of the Nevada Equal Franchise Society and its president Anne Martin who organized the successful campaign, 1912-1914. (in approval process)
