

EPA Seeking Nominations to the Good Neighbor Environmental Board (GNEB)

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) invites nominations from a diverse range of qualified candidates to be considered for appointment to its Good Neighbor Environmental Board (GNEB). Nominations will be accepted until vacancies are filled in March 2020.

The GNEB was created in 1992 by the Enterprise for the Americas Initiative Act, Public Law 102-532, 7 USC Section 5404. Implementing authority was delegated to the Administrator of EPA under Executive Order 12916. The GNEB is charged by statute with submitting an annual report to the President on the need for implementation of environmental and infrastructure projects within the states of the United States contiguous to Mexico.

The following criteria will be used to evaluate nominees:

- Background and experiences that would help members contribute to the diversity of perspectives on the committee (e.g., geographic, economic, social, cultural, educational, and other considerations);
- Represents a sector or group that helps to shape border-region environmental policy or represents a group that is affected by border region environmental policy;
- Has extensive professional knowledge and experience with the issues that the GNEB examines (i.e. environmental and infrastructure issues along the U.S.-Mexico border), including the bi-national dimension of these issues;
- Demonstrates senior level experience that will fill a need of the GNEB in bringing a new and relevant dimension to its deliberations;
- Possesses a demonstrated ability to work in a consensus building process with a wide range of representatives from diverse constituencies;
- and the ability to contribute approximately 10 to 15 hours per month to the GNEB?s activities, including face-to-face meetings, conference calls and participation in the development of the GNEB?s annual report to the President and comment letters.

The Environmental Justice Collaborative Problem-Solving (EJCPS) Cooperative Agreement Program provides funding to support community-based organizations in their efforts to collaborate and partner with local stakeholder groups (e.g., local businesses and industry, local government, medical service providers, and academia) as they develop and implement community-driven solutions that address environmental and/or public health issues for underserved communities. The EJCPS program will award approximately \$1.2 million nationwide for this competitive opportunity. EPA anticipates issuing 10 awards (1 per EPA region) of up to \$120,000 each. These awards are for two-year projects.

- tribal organizations


