

Crosby Kemper III Named Director of IMLS

Crosby Kemper III takes the helm of the Institute of Museum and Library Services as its sixth director this week, following his commission by the White House on January 24 and confirmation by the United States Senate on January 10. IMLS, an independent government agency, is the primary source of federal support for the nation's museums and libraries.

"On a daily basis, our libraries and museums bridge, unify, and inspire communities throughout the nation," said Kemper. "I'm honored to have the opportunity to lead the Institute of Museum and Library Services and help ensure that everyone in the United States, wherever located, has access to essential museum, library, and information services."

The IMLS director position is a four-year term alternatively held by individuals with special competence in the library field and those with expertise in museum services. Kemper succeeds Dr. Kathryn K. Matthew, who served as director from 2015 to 2020.

Kemper is a dedicated advocate for education and learning for people of all ages and backgrounds. He comes to IMLS from the Kansas City Public Library, where as director, he established the library as one of the city's leading cultural destinations and a hub of community engagement.

Under his direction, the library made special event programming a high-profile focus, with more than half a million people attending its evening programs or visiting exhibits in the art galleries. During his tenure, the Kansas City Public Library received multiple awards, including IMLS's National Medal for Museum and Library Service in 2008.

Kemper also recently served as chair of the board of directors of the Schools, Health, & Libraries Broadband Coalition, which supports open, affordable broadband connections for local community organizations.

Kemper's career began in banking; he most recently served as CEO of UMB Financial Corporation. Kemper has received the Difference Maker Award from the Urban League of Kansas City, the William F. Yates Medallion for Distinguished Service from William Jewell College, and the 2010 Harmony Humanitarian Hoffman Legacy Award. His board service has included the Kansas City Symphony, the Black Archives of Mid-America, Union Station Kansas City, and the Heart of America Shakespeare Festival.

Kemper is the editor of and a contributor to Winston Churchill: Resolution, Defiance, Magnanimity, Good Will, published by the University of Missouri Press. He holds a bachelor's degree in history from Yale University.

Laws For The Birds Are For The Birds

- Federal protections for migratory birds have been on the books for over a century. The Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918 (MBTA) made it illegal to pursue, hunt, take, capture, kill or sell listed birds without a waiver. The act covers more than 1,000 species and has helped restore populations of birds like the great egret.
- For decades it has been the threat of fines and prosecution that has encouraged industries to take steps to protect birds, like affixing red lights on communication towers.
- After President Trump took office his Interior Department issued an opinion that the law was too broad and should apply only to provable intentional acts, and the administration discouraged local governments and businesses from taking simple precautionary measures to protect birds. Currently federal wildlife officials rarely investigate bird deaths.
- On Thursday the US Fish and Wildlife Service, operating under the Interior Department, moved to drop the threat of punishment altogether for oil and gas companies, construction crews and other organizations that kill birds "incidentally," arguing that businesses that accidently kill birds ought to be able to operate without fear of prosecution. Conservationists said the proposed new regulation would cement the Interior Department's opinion, substantially weaken the MBTA, and endanger millions of birds. (NYT)



One Man's Trash Is Now Legally Another Man's Treasure

- France's parliament passed <u>a ground-breaking, wide-ranging, first-of-its-kind anti-waste</u> <u>law</u> on Thursday. The legislation bans companies from throwing away unsold goods, and covers the gamut from clothes and cosmetics to electrical items and hygiene products. Everything must now be reused, redistributed or recycled.
- It also phases out the use of paper till receipts and single-use plastics, and encourages pharmacies to sell certain medications in individual doses. The new law extends to producers, importers and distributors, including online firms like Amazon, which must now donate unsold non-food goods, except those that pose a health or safety risk.
- Already on the books is a law requiring supermarkets to donate unsold food to charities. (Guardian)

Microsoft Going Carbon Negative

The scientific consensus is clear. The world confronts an urgent carbon problem. While the world will need to reach net zero carbon, those of us who can afford to move faster and go further should do so. That was the message Microsoft President Brad Smith delivered this month in announcing the company's ambitious goal become carbon negative by 2030 and by 2050 remove from the environment all the carbon the company has emitted either directly or by electrical consumption since it was founded in 1975.

Said Smith, "we recognize that progress requires not just a bold goal but a detailed plan." As described in the announcement, Microsoft has already launched an aggressive program to cut its carbon emissions by more than half by 2030, both for direct emissions and for its entire supply and value chain. The company will fund this in part by expanding its internal carbon fee, in place since 2012 and increased last year, to start charging not only direct emissions, but those from its supply and value chains.



Wonderful things happening. At home, we recently bought an RV to take road trips and visit family. At work the Churchill County Museum and library partnered with the FPST Library and cultural department to create a VR (Virtual Reality) Program of Hidden Cave, that will be available in all three locations. Major props to the tribal councul in their partnership. In my civic activities I was recently appointed Chairman to the Nevada Indian Territory, Continuing on with some exciting existing projects and looking towards a bright future. With another group I'm working with some incredibally motivated movers and shakers in Northern Nevada on another non-profit (TBA).

I forgot to mention we are creating the VR to promote a new program that will bring local schools to the museum to learn about Paiute history in Nevada. Its called Hidden Cave Days modeled after the Lovelock Cave days. I've been helping with that for the past 10 years. The Hidden Cave days will be featured in October along with a teacher-in-service training along a Temporary Native Amerin art show.

Protecting Native Children & Families



The Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) is a long-standing federal law protecting the well-being of Native children by upholding family integrity and stability within their community. **Brackeen v. Bernhardt** is the lawsuit brought by three states and individual plaintiffs, who allege ICWA — a federal statute that has been in effect for more than 40 years and has helped thousands of Native children maintain ties to their families and their tribes—is unconstitutional.
