Great great grandma Yagotsome (Cry Beads aka Mary Dave) she is the woman on my FB profile. She had a tattoos on her chin they were three dots in the shape of a triangle. I've dreampt of getting the same one since the the mid 90's. The women in Lovelock use to have the 1-11's, the had them as a personal choice and adornment. Aunt later told me sometimes they used to identify missing women if they were stolen from the tribe and found later, but that was along time ago befor contact. I can't remember if she said they used porcupine or pine needles to tap with and they used pine resen as the pigment. The men and women who bear the tat's are beautiful, everyone of them. I love it.

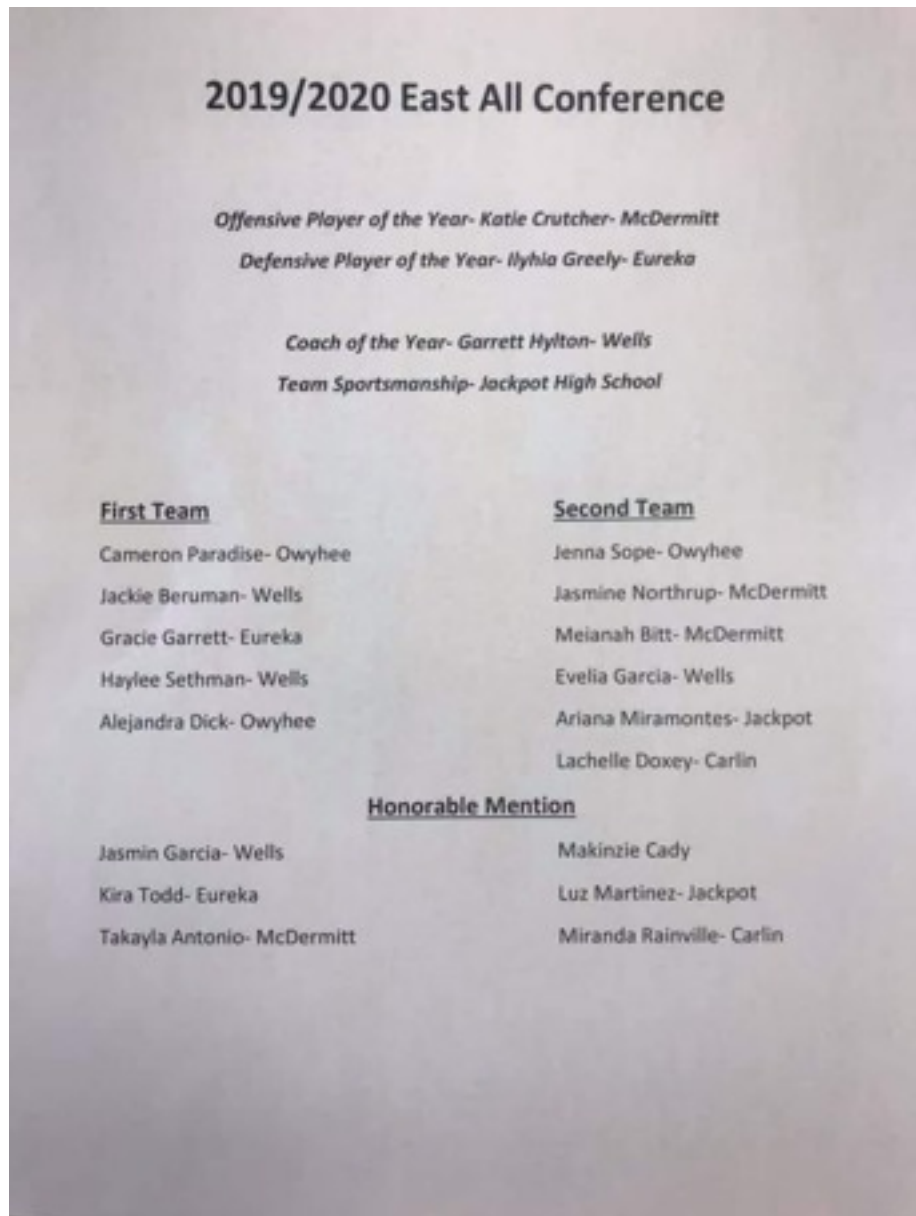

This arrived after the Thursday Journal went out:

I wanted to provide some important information regarding several recent lands bills within the state and some specifics on how they impact our work around extraction. There are potentially nine of these bills in Nevada right now—in Pershing, Clark, Washoe, Douglas, Churchill, Nye, Lyon, Lincoln, and Mineral Counties!

These bills would allow currently public land to be sold to developers. This is a concern for many reasons; it could result in sprawl, require unsustainable amounts of water in our desert climate, and drastically impact the quality of life for those within these counties.

In terms of extraction, lands bills which make possible the privatization of public lands are generally scary because they ultimately provide a means for mining companies to avoid the NEPA process. Although there is a NEPA process for land transfers, it only analyzes the impact of the transfer itself—and is not the robust process currently required for analyzing the impact of and permitting mines on public land. *When public lands become private lands, places to mine which previously required NEPA review will no longer require that. This is a big red flag for those of us who are focused on protecting the well being of land, air, water, wildlife, and human communities from adverse effects of extraction!*

Today (2/20/2020) in Reno, Washoe County is hosting a public hearing where you can voice your comments and concerns on its public lands bill, officially named the “Truckee Meadows Public Lands Management Act,” and there will be:

Bill Would Allow Students to Wear Tribal Regalia at School Graduation

STATE CAPITOL, PHOENIX – A bill introduced by Representative David Cook (R-8) would require that a school district governing board or a charter school to permit students, belonging to a federally-recognized tribe, to wear cultural regalia while participating in a graduation ceremony.

[HB2120](#), which passed out of the House Education Committee late Monday, has bipartisan support and more than 20 cosponsors.

"I am proud to sponsor this bipartisan bill on behalf of the people of District 8, including the Gila River Indian Community, who have been directly affected by this issue," said Representative Cook. **"I deeply appreciate my House colleague, Representative Arlando Teller, for his support and effort to help resolve this issue affecting many Native American students in our state."**

"Native Americans have pride in every stage they achieve," said Representative Teller (D-7). **"Graduating from high school is an accomplishment brings great pride to families in our community. Wearing regalia gives respect to an Indigenous student's family, themselves and their culture. This is not a partisan issue it's an Arizona solution."**

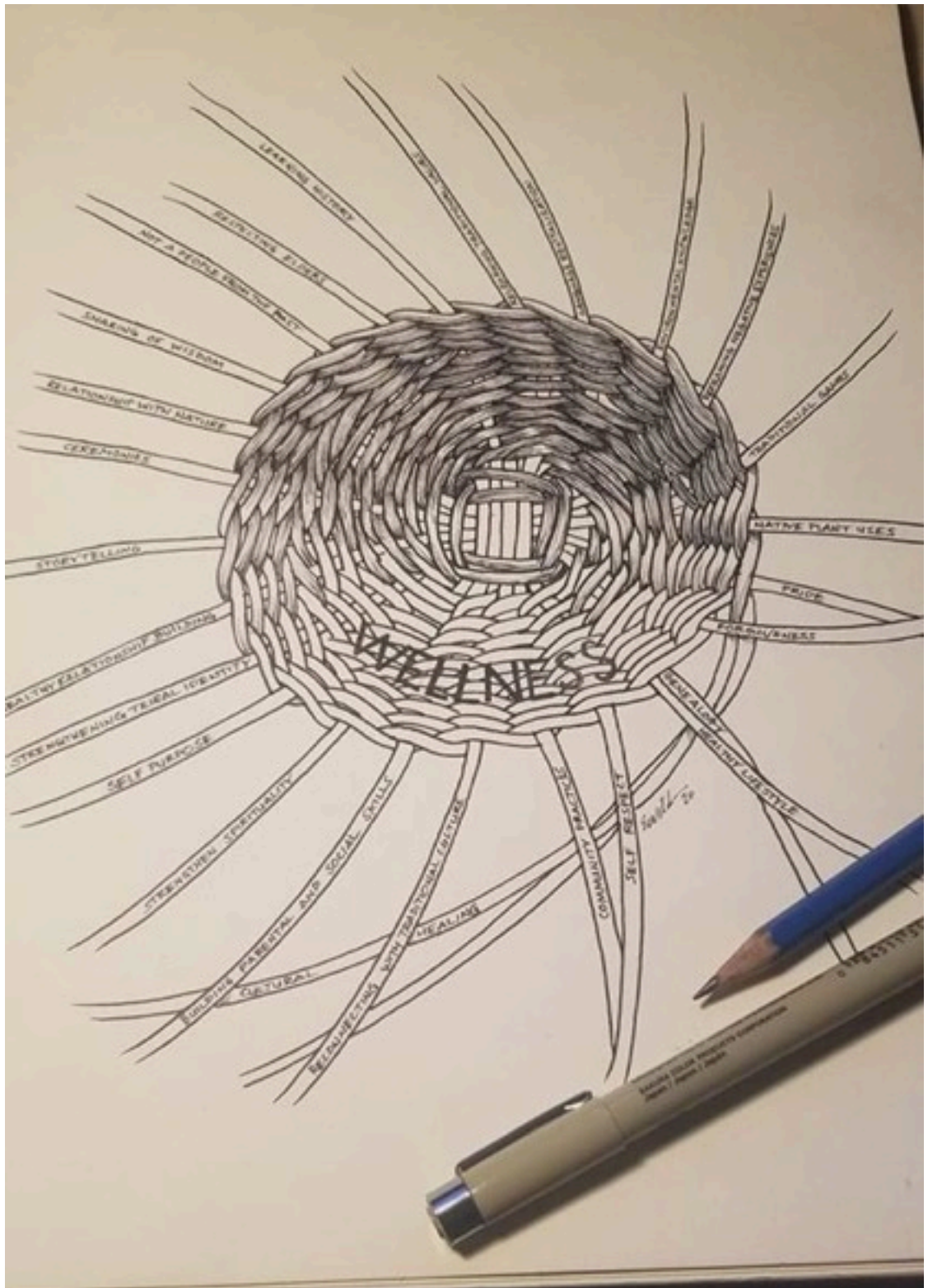
