Costa Rican indigenous land activist killed by armed mob

- Yehry Rivera, 45, latest to die in spate of violence
- Brörán community has been trying to reclaim ancestral land

A Costa Rican indigenous defender has been killed by an armed mob while trying to reclaim ancestral land – the latest in a spate of violence targeting native communities in Central America's safest country.

Yehry Rivera, 45, from the Brörán community in Térraba, was shot dead around 11pm on Monday after being surrounded by a group of angry locals armed with sticks, machetes, stones and at least one gun.

The attack took place amid mounting tensions in Térraba, where human rights groups had warned authorities in recent days about non-indigenous groups violently confronting Brörán families reclaiming ancestral land.



The events leading up to Monday night's fatal shooting remain unclear, but video footage seen by the Guardian shows members of the group throwing stones and insults over Rivera's bleeding body, with a police car parked close by.

The killing comes just two weeks after Mainor Ortiz Delgado, 29, a leader of the Bri bri indigenous people in neighbouring Salitre, was wounded in a gun attack, and less than a year since [Sergio Rojas Ortiz](#), 59, was shot dead. Both cases remain unsolved.



BREAKING NEWS: An employee from the Wildhorse Resort and Casino, owned by the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation, is the third presumptive positive case of COVID-19 in Oregon. Oregon health officials say the case is an adult from Umatilla County who is hospitalized in Walla Walla, Washington, and attended a youth basketball game at Weston Middle School on Feb. 29. An incident command has been implemented by the tribe, which makes up the staff from the Yellowhawk Tribal Health Center and the tribal government. The tribe's Nixyaawii Community School, head start, daycare and senior center will be temporarily closed to sanitize starting today at 12pm local time. "All community events on the Umatilla Indian Reservation are cancelled for the week of March 2 to 8, 2020." This is a developing story.

In Case You Missed It: Major Victory for West Berkeley Shellmound

In October, the Save the West Berkeley Shellmound Campaign [won a major victory](#) when Judge Frank Roesch agreed with the City of Berkeley and the Ohlone people that a shellmound could legally be considered a "historic structure" and was therefore exempt from a fast-track affordable housing development permit as mandated by SB35. In his decision, Judge Roesch wrote: "A historic structure does not cease to be a historic structure or capable of demolition because it is ruined or buried. That proviso is without basis in the text of the statute and would exclude many of the world's most beloved archeological treasures, such as Hezekiah's tunnel in Jerusalem, the Roman ruins in Pompeii, the mausoleum of Qin Shi Huang, the cave cities of Cappadocia, and the tombs in the Valley of the Kings."

Judge Roesch's ruling is being appealed. Stay tuned. For more info visit: [Shellmound.org](#).



Thoughts on Chuck Trimble

The headline, "Tim Giago: His passing leaves a big hole in the world of Native journalism" was somewhat misleading in that I thought Tim had passed. Imagine my sorrow when I found out it was my long-time friend, Chuck Trimble.

I met Chuck in 1970 when I was one of ten individuals invited to participate in the founding of the American Indian Press Association. He picked me up at the Spokane Airport and immediately told me that I wasn't what he expected.

Being the ultimate gentleman, he attempted to “help” me but I grabbed my suitcase before he could and opened the door as he was reaching for it. In other words, I was this rough-edged farmer-type person unaccustomed to being treated like a lady.

Later he told me that he met with Vine Deloria, Jr. to select various Indian editors to invite to this meeting and Vine suggested that I had to be invited. Based on the editorial content of *The Native Nevadan*, they thought I was much older and much bigger in appearance. Since I was neither, he was confused as to how to treat me and as I later came to learn, I could very easily confuse him. He eventually gave up trying to figure me out and just regarded me as being "weird."

Over the years we became fast friends despite my weirdness and his lack of understanding of how to treat a very unlady-like person. We kept in touch over the years and we shared our thoughts on the wide spectrum of Indian affairs—he being the more thoughtful and me being the more radical in our approach to Indian news.

I am so sorry he passed because with him, as with other Indian intellects who have passed, he had so much knowledge to share and not enough time. Rest well my friend. Carole Wright
