I am still jet lagged from my recent trip to Kauai, where **<u>Tribal Justice</u>** screened at the inaugural Social Awareness Film Festival. It was great to see Peter Bratt and his terrific film *Dolores*, and to be with my friend Oren Rudavsky who screened his American Masters film on Joseph Pulitzer.

The films at the festival ranged far and wide, addressing important social issues around Native Hawaiians, Mexican Americans, Native

Americans, journalism, and more.

A number of indigenous people from Hawaii and the mainland came to see <u>Tribal Justice</u> and joined a vigorous discussion afterwards.


We were invi
