#### Sample of tribal declarations re Coronavirus:

Our Walker River Paiute Tribe declared a State of Emergency yesterday due to the Coronavirus (Covid-19). Starting today non-essential staff are being sent home until April 6th, that includes our Water Resources Department staff. The clinic staff, fire department, law enforcement, finance, senior staff, housing, waste management and social services will continue working. All of your essential needs will be met as best as possible. Staff are urged to stay at home and self-quarantine for their safety and the safety of their families. Some other changes:

No fishing or camping permits will be sold and no visitors will be allowed at Weber. Tribal police will be patrolling.

Deliveries will be made to the EMS House ie. Fed Ex.

There will be no rentals of tribal facilities, ie. community center.

Housing will only be dealing with real emergencies, ie. hot water heaters or stoves not working, etc.

Public Works will deal with emergencies only, no general maintenance. Call Al Roberts if you have a real emergency at 775-722-0763.

Notices will be posted in the community, sent home with elder food deliveries and posted on the Tribe's Facebook page. Please share this information with your family and friends.

Don't tell anyone but us indigenous have always been here since the beginning of time. For reals tho, we didn't think it would happen in our lifetime. A few nights ago, I had a dream of Sun Dance, it was so real! It was about prayer and strength. About forgiving, about love and compassion. It was about unity. Mostly the dream was about the tree of life. The renewal as when we take out the previous years tree and bring in the new tree. It was an elder tree, but then as we were carrying before we planted it turned to a young tree, almost sapling, I'm praying for that understanding. I remember being given a piece of that tree in the dream. At the beach I found a piece of driftwood that looked like that piece. But if you saw the film I posted. That log laying against the tree that was talking, that was the piece. Why am I telling you this? I don't know. Cause I care, hope this helps. We Are Indigenous Strong!
