OPINION: Entire 9th Circuit Court should hear climate change case brought by children

In California's clinics and hospitals, we see the damage climate change is doing. The wildfire season began in May, due to abnormally hot and dry conditions. With their developing lungs, children are particularly vulnerable to the terrible smoke that has become a routine yearly occurrence, sending them in droves into our emergency rooms with trouble breathing. We've seen babies and older children admitted for dangerous dehydration during heat waves and displaced families with children suffering from toxic stress that places them at a higher lifetime risk for chronic illness.

As competition for water supplies increases in the West, a new visitor is making people nervous: private investors.

Supplies that have been provided to participants include beads, earring wires, and hoops, Blue Corn, Juniper Ash, painting sets, watercolor pads, Tepary beans, face scrub supplies, and more.

May's classes included beading, cloth mask making, graduation corn husk centerpieces (personalized), desert bean soup, face scrub, Read it and Eat (cooking and literacy for families with young children), Tepary bean hummus, and another beading class.

We have some super exciting classes planned for June and July.

Thank you to the Seattle Indian Health Board and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Good Health and Wellness in Indian Country for funding this innovative program.

Use of Technology with Young Children - Departments of Health and Human Services and Education released a joint policy brief on the use of technology with young children to help families and early educators use technology to promote active, engaged, meaningful, and socially interactive learning. The American Academy of Pediatrics suggest for children younger than 18 months to avoid use of screen media other than video-chatting. Parents of children 18-24 months of age who want to introduce digital media should choose high quality programming, and watch it with their children to help them understand what they're seeing. For children ages 2-5 years, one hour of technology use is appropriate per day, inclusive of time spent at home and in early learning settings and across devices. 

My grandma Bernice used Noxzema on her face, the smell of it brings back memories of her.


Brenda Henry

Tammie Henry Gramma was always there w/ her husband. Making breakfast/cooking dinner for


everyone. She always spoke piaute! It felt like home being around her. 💞 🙏 🖗
