

Do you remember having to take a college course in something like Elizabethan poetry and wondering how this will ever be applicable in real life? Perhaps while taking algebra you were wondering how important finding X really was. Google may agree with you.

The tech juggernaut has just announced a series of courses designed to teach students the specific skills that todays forward-thinking companies are looking for. 

On this day in 1900, U.S. Army physician James Carroll allowed a "loaded" mosquito that had fed on yellow fever patients to bite him in an investigation of Cuban scientist Carlos Finlay's theory that mosquitoes were transmitting yellow fever. After Carroll came down with the sickness (he survived but died seven years later from heart disease likely related to yellow fever), his colleague Walter Reed was able to confirm the blood-suckers were spreading the virus.
