





Among the records are portraits of individuals and families, and images of work, military service, crafts, medical care, and athletics, among others.

This project was created in consultation with a broad range of users and stakeholders, including members of Tribal Nation communities, information science professionals with experience in Native American records, and representatives of organizations with connections to Tribal communities on the topics used in the finding aid.



This project would not have been possible without the contributions of our citizen archivists and experts in Native American studies. Earlier this year, we launched a Citizen Archivist mission to tag photographs using those identified topical subject tags. Each of these subject tags is now used to pull photographs from the Catalog into the finding aid. We still need your help!
