My old friend and jail buddy Joe Sanchez from Duckwater used to give what he called "Indian 101" presentations to Citizen Alert gatherings, and began with what he called the colonial court system of the US that never gave the Western Shoshone or other Indigenous nations a fair deal.

When Judge Thompson ruled against the Dann Sisters and the Western Shoshone Nation, he prefaced it with a statement about how his hands were tied by previous decisions.

The judge who ruled in favor of Barrick's spiritual genocide at Mt. Tenabo in 2008 used the same rationale. Now, at Thacker Pass, the same damn excuses. It's up to all of us non-Natives to rise and speak up.



#### **Talking Points (please personalize):**

- State your NV location and that you support the regulation language. Thanking the commissioners for their work and consideration of this regulation could also be helpful.
- Hunters in Nevada are voicing support for this ban. Wildlife killing contests ignore hunting
  ethics and Nevada's outdoor legacy. Many hunters and hunting groups across the state support
  Commission General Regulation 503 and language that bans wildlife killing contests in Nevada.
- This regulatory prohibition is not a ban on hunting and does not impact other laws. Individuals will still be allowed to hunt coyotes and other wildlife according to state laws. Following the example set by neighboring states, the language of a potential ban can make clear that it will not prohibit fishing tournaments or "Big Buck" hunts.
- Nevada should join neighboring states (Arizona, California, Colorado, and New Mexico) in enacting commonsense prohibitions. Contest participants from other states are now coming to Nevada and killing wildlife that should be managed, enjoyed, and appreciated alive by Nevadans as part of their natural heritage.
- Eight states have already prohibited wildlife killing contests. As awareness spreads, Americans are increasingly demanding an end to these killing contests. Nevada should join these states to lead the way and set an example for ethical, science-based wildlife management.
- The majority of Nevadans believe people should coexist in harmony with wildlife. According
  to a recent study by Dietsch and colleagues (including Project Coyote Science Advisory Board
  member <u>Dr. Jeremy Bruskotter</u>), more than 85% of Nevadans believe coyotes should be managed
  with non-lethal coexistence practices.
- There is no scientific evidence that indiscriminately killing coyotes reduces their populations, increases populations of game animals like deer, or protects livestock.
   Randomly killing coyotes disrupts their pack structure, which can increase their populations and increase conflicts between coyotes, humans, and domestic animals. Preventing conflicts by utilizing humane, non-lethal solutions is more effective.
- Wildlife targeted by contests play an important ecological role in healthy ecosystems. For
  example, coyotes reduce rabbit and rodent populations, scavenge animal carcasses, and increase
  biodiversity.



### **Tribute to John Trudell**

June 14, 2020

"When Columbus got off the boat he asked us who we were. We said we're the human beings, we're the people. Conceptually the Europeans didn't understand that, it was beyond their conceptual reality. They didn't see us. They couldn't see who we were. Historically speaking, we went from being Indians to pagans to savages to hostiles to militants to activists to Native Americans.

Now its five hundred years later & they still can't see us. We are still invisible. They don't see us as human beings, (their answers are always interrupting and fragmented, individualized denials) but we've been saying to them all along that's what we are [that's who we are], We are invisible to them because we are still the human beings. We're still the People, but they never call us that. They taught us to call ourselves Indians. Now they're teaching us how to call ourselves Native Americans. Its not who we are. We're the People. They can't see us as human beings.

But they can't see themselves as human beings. The invisibility is at every level, its not just that we're tucked away out of sight. We're the evidence of the crime. They can't deal with the reality of who we are because then they have to deal with what they have done. If they deal with the reality of who we are, they have to deal with the reality of who they aren't. So they have to fear us, not recognize us, not like us. The very fact of calling us 'Indians' creates a new identity for us, an identity that began with their arrival. Changing identity, creating a new perceptual reality, is another form of genocide. It's like severing a spiritual umbilical cord that reaches into the ancestral past. The history of the Indians begins with the arrival of the Europeans. The history of the People begins with the beginning of the history of the People. The history of the People is one of cooperation, collectivity, and living in balance. The history of the Indians is one of genocide, rather that a history of peace and balance. The history of the People under attack, the Indians, in an evolutionary context is not very long; it's only five hundred years. The objective of civilizing us is to make Indian history become our permanent reality. The necessary objective of Native people is to outlast this attack, however long it takes, to keep our identity alive."

#### **Nevada Native Plant Society**

Pinus monpohylla, singleleaf pinyon, has large, nutritious seeds containing all twenty amino acids as well as several vitamins and substantial quantities of polyunsaturated fatty acids. Many birds and mammals eat pine nuts, and the pinyon pine is largely dependent on dispersal by Pinyon Jays (Gymnorhinus cyanocephalus) and Clark's Nutcrackers (Nucifraga columbiana) that cache the seeds for use in winter. Pinyon also provides valuable cover habitat for numerous game birds and grazing mammals, particularly where it is intermixed with other vegetation types that provide good forage.

Pine nut harvesting provided a staple food source and became closely linked with the cultures of native peoples who continue traditional pine nut harvests today. 
