<u>Tribes along the Colorado River navigate a stacked settlement process to claim their water rights</u>

By High Country News, 3/1/2022 - In early January, Lake Powell, a reservoir fed by the Colorado River, reached critically low levels. The bathtub ring around its receding edges has spent the last year gracing the pages of news publications across the nation, accompanied by increasingly panicked concern about Glen Canyon Dam's hydropower turbines, which cannot operate reliably if the lake is lower than 3,490 feet. At the start of 2022, Powell's water levels were just 46 feet above that threshold.

Webinar: Women Leaders on the Frontlines of Forest Protection





The Commission for Cultural Centers and Historic Preservation (CCCHP), which focuses on identifying and prioritizing grant funding for historic buildings and archaeological sites to be used as cultural centers, is updating their 10-Year plan. A public input survey on the future goals and objectives for the Commission is available **now until March 31st.**

"By participating in our survey, you can help protect Nevada's one-of-a-kind historic and cultural treasures for generations to come."


Since 1993, the CCCHP program has provided more than \$44.7 million in grants for over 100 projects throughout Nevada to preserve and restore the state's iconic cultural centers and archaeological attractions. CCCHP grants have supported a wide variety of projects, from world-famous properties like the Mob Museum in Las Vegas (\$2 million), to more localized projects like the Elko Visitor's Center (\$100,000).

The CCCHP is led by representatives from the Nevada Humanities Committee, the Board of Museums and History, the Nevada Arts Council, the State Council on Libraries and Literacy, and the tourism industry. CCCHP grants are open to government agencies and nonprofit organizations in Nevada. Projects must include a historic property, feature, or archaeological site in need of rehabilitation or pre-development work.

Nancy Egan is a Tribal member of the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes of the Duck Valley Indian Reservation. She is the daughter of the late Delia Smart and Willard Egan Sr. Paternal grandparents are the late Hubert and Elaine Egan. Maternal grandparents the late Mildred Thomas and Steven Smart. Her tribal affiliation includes both Shoshone and Paiute ancestry.

Nancy has worked in various positions with the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes, and other tribal, state and federal agencies. In her previous position, she served as the Chief Executive Officer with the Tribes. Nancy was the Director of the Native Connections program for Duck Valley Indian Reservation, where she worked toward the wellness of the spiritual and mental well-being of the Shoshone-Paiute people, who may suffer from substance abuse or mental health issues. Nancy has worked with USDA as the Food Distribution Director distributing food to disadvantage families living on the Reservation. She served as President of the Western Association Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations serving 34 Tribes in six Western states. Also, Nancy served as the President of the National Association of Food Distribution working with over 260 Tribes. She continued to pursue her educational endeavors in Social Work and management. In pursuit of fulfilling the way of traditional values and academics, Nancy obtained her Master of Business Administration degree to continue to contribute to the community. She was recognized and awarded "A Woman Making History," from the BSU Women's Center, 2006.

She served as Board President of the Women of Color Alliance and attended the Women's Campaign School at Yale University, 2004 and helped bring the campaign school to the University of Idaho in 2005; where young women from all walks of life were able to attend a prestigious campaign school and learn from top professional women leaders, how to run for office or manage a campaign. As a former Tribal Chairwoman, she understands the importance of making positive contributions to the Tribal communities and external agencies.
