The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has created a series of training webinars on the environmental review process designed specifically for Tribes. These training webinars were created based on feedback provided during Tribal consultation on developing a coordinated environmental review. This training series is one of the deliverables in the Plan to Implement Coordinated Environmental Reviews, which was issued by an interagency workgroup in April 2022. ## **Environmental Review Training Webinar Series:**

# Use of HUD Environmental Forms

This webinar will provide a basic overview of the following three HUD 24 CFR Part 58 forms:

- Exempt or Categorically Excluded, Not Subject to 58.5
- <u>Categorically Excluded, Subject to 58.5</u>
- Section 58 Environmental Assessments

This webinar will focus on applying these forms to activities in a typical Indian Housing Plan or other projects commonly seen in Tribal communities and clarify who signs them.

# • Aggregation

Aggregating geographically and/or functionally related activities improves the efficiency of environmental reviews and is required by HUD regulations. This webinar will discuss how to include the full scope of a project in a project description for an environmental review and provide different examples of project aggregation for projects in Tribal communities.

Mary Golda Ross (1908-2008)

First Native American Aerospace Engineer

• Ross was the great-granddaughter of Cherokee Nation Chief John Ross and grew up in the Cherokee Nation capital of Tahlequah, Oklahoma.

• She earned a bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1928 and a master's degree in 1938.

• During WWII, she was hired as a mathematician by Lockheed and worked on the P-38 Lightning, one of the fastest airplanes at the time.

 In 1952, she joined Lockheed's top-secret Advanced Development Projects division, commonly known as Skunk Works.

• She worked on the cutting-edge Agena rocket project and on preliminary design concepts for flyby missions to Venus and Mars.

• When asked about women entering the space program, Ross said that women would make "wonderful astronauts" but added that she'd "rather stay down here and analyze the data."

Because we are only meeting in-person quarterly we have chosen the wonderfully scenic venue of Montreux Golf & Country Club for our breakfast event meetings. We have also not forgotten all our stalwart sponsors, members, and supporters from outside the region. Our in-person programs will be recorded and available for viewing on our website shortly after these events. We will also continue our regular virtual (Zoom) events and the Ukraine Special Topics Sessions.

Our in-person events will be structured to capture multiple perspectives on timely topics relevant to our state and the region. Our next quarterly event will be the *Nevada Energy Security Forum* on Wednesday, June 22nd, 2022. Breakfast will be served from 8:00 to 8:50 and the extended program will be from 9:00 to 10:30. Panelists at the *Nevada Energy Security Forum* will discuss challenges and opportunities for Nevada and the region as we transition to alternative energy resources and away from fossil fuels.
