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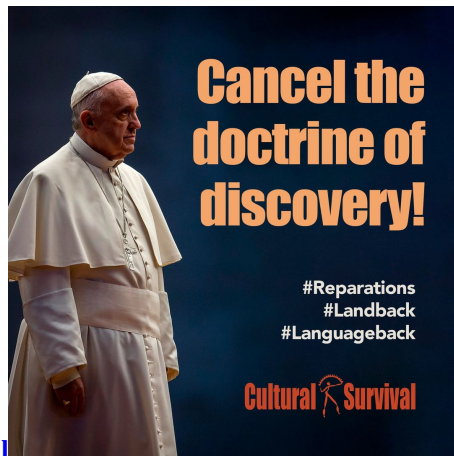

These giant skulls are stashed away, somewhat "out-of-sight, out-of-mind", at the Humbolt Museum in Nevada. They are the remains of the last of the "Red Headed Giants" of the area, who were trapped inside Lovelock Cave by the Paiute Indians, then suffocated to death by smoke from fires lit at the mouth of the cave. Some skulls of the large boned & tall stature people, recovered from the cave, had red hair.

Last week, we [opened up applications for the first in a series of grants](#) that will support ambitious projects collecting primary source materials on DocumentCloud. This first round of grants will award up to \$10,000 to five projects using DocumentCloud's Add-On infrastructure to build and maintain specific document collections.

We encourage applicants from various fields and backgrounds, including the journalism, research, archival, public advocacy and civic technology communities. If you're interested in applying, here are the criteria on which projects will be evaluated:

- **Impact:** When successfully executed, will it substantially enhance access or understanding of an important document collection? This could range in focus from one important clearly-defined collection you are already working with (for example, a cache of whistleblower documents or a key historical archive of presidential records) or something that offers a more widespread utility, such as helping monitor and analyze federal or state contracts in a more friendly and permanent way. We're particularly interested in projects focused on helping preserve materials at risk due to clearly identified challenges.
- **Creativity:** How novel and unique is the approach to the challenge you've identified? Ideally, projects go beyond simply storing documents in an archive to thinking about the best way to address key challenges, whether those are new approaches to gathering and verifying information or ways to involve a broader range of participants.
- **Ability:** How likely is the team to succeed at the proposed project? We welcome both prototypes that are looking for a way to get across the finish line as well as ideas starting from scratch. You should have a good sense of both the nature of the documents being collected and the technical, social and legal considerations involved in the proposed effort.
- **Benefit:** How much better will the world be thanks to this effort? Will it help strengthen a community or raise awareness about a key issue? Could it help rectify or even prevent harm or inform future generations?

Our panel of reviewers will evaluate and consider applications on a month-by-month rolling basis. The grants are made possible by [our collaboration with Filecoin Foundation for the Decentralized Web](#).

Legislature Authorizes Potable Reuse Program

As we reported [previously](#), Arizona House Bill 2129, approved in the recently completed legislative session, prompted the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) to plan for the development of permanent standards and regulations for direct potable reuse (DPR) of ultra-treated reclaimed water. According to the Arizona Municipal Water Users Association, “utilizing ... recycled water to its full potential is a critical water augmentation strategy – it provides a safe, locally controlled, drought-proof water supply that can be available far sooner than ... water importation options.” HB 2129 stated, “on or before December 31, 2024, the Director shall adopt all rules necessary to establish and implement a direct potable reuse of treated water program including, but not limited to, rules establishing permitting standards and a permit application process.” In addition, it appropriated \$1,500,000 in each of fiscal years 2022/23 and 2023/24 for ADEQ to plan, implement, and operate the DPR program. The agency will hold a series of stakeholder meetings to help “address minimum performance requirements, source control, design elements to prevent contamination of the water supply, operator qualifications and training, technical, managerial, and financial requirements, uniform terminology, and other issues.” The public is invited to participate, online and by phone, in the upcoming stakeholder meeting to be held Thursday, July 28, 2022, from 1:00 to 3:00 pm.

He is the owner of a large personal library (containing thirty thousand books), and separates visitors into two categories: those who react with “Wow! Signore, professore dottore Eco, what a library you have ! How many of these books have you read?” and the others - a very small minority - who get the point that a private library is not an ego-boosting appendage but a research tool. Read books are far less valuable than unread ones. The library should contain as much of what you don’t know as your financial means, mortgage rates and the currently tight real-estate market allows you to put there. You will accumulate more knowledge and more books as you grow older, and the growing number of unread books on the shelves will look at you menacingly. # Wadsworth Nearly Wiped Out by an Incendiary Fire

July 22, 1907  
Reno Evening Gazette

## Fiend Started it to Satisfy a Grudge---He Confesses But Lynching is Prevented---Fire Burned Eight Hours---Thirteen Buildings Destroyed---Little Insurance

Seeking to satisfy a grudge against Constable Milo Crosby of Wadsworth because that officer shot his companion for resisting arrest several months ago, Scott Lauver a laborer in Wadsworth, started a fire in front of Jim Crosby's saloon yesterday morning that resulted in the destruction of more than half of the business portion of the old railroad town. The fire was started about 5:10 o'clock Sunday morning and burned with great rapidity clear from the Griswold general merchandise store, near the center of Main street, east to the Truckee river, laying twelve large buildings and a number of sheds in ashes and resulting in a loss of about \$15,000.

The citizens fought the blaze fiercely and every effort was put forth to check it before the whole eastern portion of the business district was destroyed, but without success. The volunteer fire department responded as soon as the Crosby saloon was discovered to be on fire, but the water pressure was not sufficient to throw the water to the top of a one-story building.

Once the flames were carried across the track to the north side of the town, where many fine residences are still standing, but the citizens succeeded in preventing a blaze starting in that portion of the little village.

### Burned Clear to the River.

The flames swept everything before them with great fury during the entire morning, and it was 1 o'clock in the afternoon before the last structure was destroyed. It was then that the tired citizens began to look for the fire-fighter, who had wilfully built a fire in front of Jim Crosby's saloon and destroyed the larger portion of the doomed railroad town. This fellow was found lying on the sidewalk in front of the Nevada hotel in a drunken stupor. He had started the fire, had laughed at the consuming flames and then, while other citizens fought for their property and homes, proceeded to fill up on whisky at an Italian saloon just across the street from the building he had fired.

### Fire-Fiend Arrested.

Exhausted and disheartened, the citizens found the man who had, just to avenge a grudge, started a fire that swept a large portion of their little city away. Although angry, they were peaceful and law-abiding citizens, and allowed Constable Milo Crosby to take his prisoner to the town jail, without offering him any injury. There were a few citizens who wanted to secure a rope and end the life of the miserable fiend, but the more peaceful citizens prevailed and the prisoner re-

mained uninjured. He will be given a fair hearing and will be punished according to the law.

### Lauver Confesses.

After being taken to the jail Lauver shook his hand in the face of Constable Crosby and shouted: "I am even with you; I started the fire." He then confessed to his crime, telling with calmness how he had waited until everyone was in bed and the town was quiet before preparing his revenge. He told how he ripped boards from a fence and piled them before the Crosby saloon. He then secured paper and matches, and started the blaze. This fire quickly ignited the dry board wall of the saloon and in a few minutes it was burning brightly. It was nearly in ashes before it was discovered. It quickly spread and in a few minutes houses on each side of it were burning.

The flames destroyed all wooden buildings standing in that district and before the last spark was extinguished the following buildings had been destroyed:

### The Buildings Destroyed.

E. W. Griswold's residence, Griswold's warehouse, George Nicklaus' saloon, Judge David Washem's office, the postoffice, Chinese bakery and restaurant, Crosby's saloon, Crosby's blacksmith shop, McCollough's butcher shop, N. A. Hummel's office building, two residences formerly owned by Dr. C. A. Richardson, now a resident of Ely.

### Griswold Is Injured

While fighting the flames Eugene Griswold, who is one of the pioneer citizens of Wadsworth, climbed to the top of his warehouse and fought the flames with buckets of water, handed to him by men below. While working on the roof of this building the roof gave way and he fell to the ground, receiving a broken jaw and injured hip. He was attended by his friends in Wadsworth and then left for his home in Oakland, where he will receive surgical treatment.

### Esden Tells of Fire.

H. W. Esden, owner of the Wadsworth Power, Light & Water company and one of the leading citizens of Wadsworth, was an arrival in Reno last evening. He helped fight the flames at Wadsworth yesterday and in speaking of the fire said:

"It was one of the worst fires that ever visited the little town and the man who started it deserves to spend the remainder of his days in prison. The fire started in front of the Crosby saloon and spread with great rapidity. We fought the best we could, but water was scarce and in a short time we

knew that the whole eastern portion of the business district was doomed.

### Lynching Prevented.

"Some of the citizens wanted to lynch Lauver, but we persuaded them to think calmly and to allow the law to take its course. He has confessed to the crime, and will surely be punished. Even had he not confessed he would be convicted, as we have plenty of evidence against him.

"After starting the fire he went to the Columbus saloon, across the track from the fire, and changed his clothes. The clothes he wore when he started the blaze had been slightly burned and he also received a slight burn on one of his hands. He is a miserable fire-fiend and I hope that he is sent to prison for life."

### Citizens Will Rebuild.

S. S. Niklaus was also an arrival from Wadsworth last night. He lost a saloon in the fire and gives an interesting story of the blaze. He says that many of the property owners will immediately rebuild and that he has already secured a building in which to reopen his saloon. Like Mr. Esden, he was unwilling to see the angry citizens take the law in their own hands and punish Lauver, and persuaded them to wait for the law to take its course.

### Wadsworth Unfortunate.

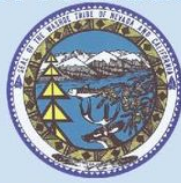
"Poor old Wadsworth seems doomed," said Mr. Niklaus, "but we will stay with her to the last. Several years ago Wadsworth was one of the most prosperous towns in Nevada and had a population of nearly 3000 people. Then the railroad company changed its line through the state and cut the old division point off the main line. The shops were moved and Wadsworth became a village of about 400 inhabitants. Shortly after this a fire occurred that wiped out two blocks of business houses in the western end of the town. The people were just recovering from this fire and were rebuilding the old town when the fire occurred yesterday and destroyed all they had accomplished.

"Wadsworth is now on the upgrade once more. It is the shipping point for Olinghouse and is the site for the large custom mill of the Nevada Consolidated Mining company of Olinghouse. It is also the shipping point for the Pyramid Lake Indian reservation and will some day be the center of a great agricultural district. We intend to entertain Secretary Garfield despite our loss and to have him do something for the town in regard to the opening of the Pyramid Lake Indian reservation, and also in regard to the irrigation scheme in this state."

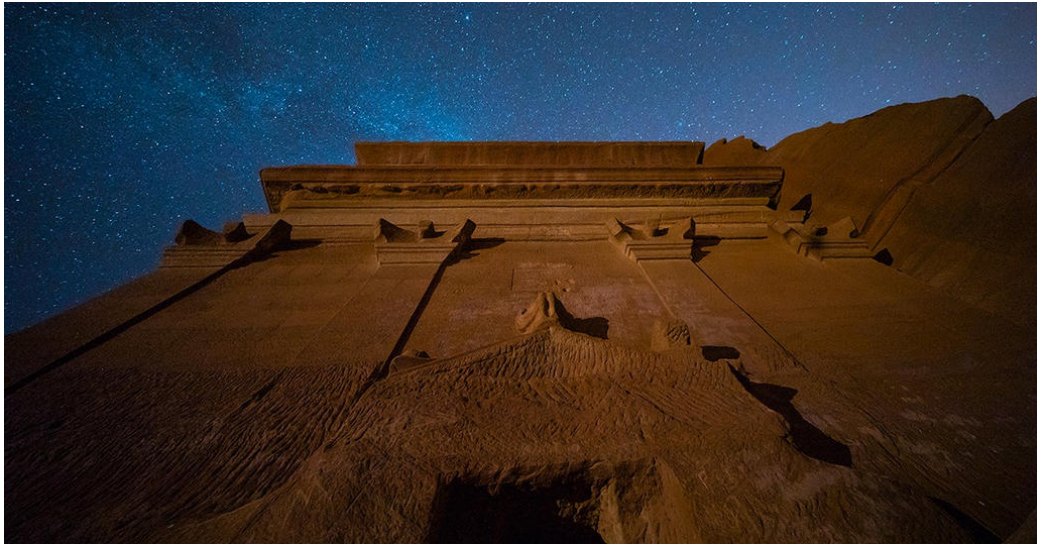
