Woodland Indian Educational Programs

It's true, we did meet a lot of folks who didn't know pumpkins are in fact edible, but it's not their fault. Commercialism is the biggest educator in our society. So here's a usual bit our audiences used to hear from me at our harvest-time demos, shortened for you here ----> Through precise methods of breeding, Native Peoples transformed wild gourds/early squash and grass into ground fruits and grain that fed large regions of Native America (and later, the world over). For thousands of years Native farmers (likely many women) bred squash/pumpkins and corn into bigger, productive and nourishing crops, able to thrive at many latitudes and altitudes, perfecting plant qualities for harvest, storage and consumption,... all for us (you and me) to prefer less edible qualities of some of these same crops?!? And why? Because holiday decorating is big business! Just think about this... We took perfectly edible pumpkins and bred new varieties from them to be thinner with a woody texture because these qualities worked better for carving... So we purposely made a fruit less pleasant to eat so we can put a face on it, then let it rot until we unceremoniously toss it. Or how about the way we just outright labeled food inedible, like the multicolor "Indian decorative corn" that graces so many doorways this time of year. How strange it is, when you think about it, that we took the work of thousands of years, the work of thousands of Native hands and minds that went into creating and perfecting crops to feed humans, that we purposely bred some of these strains to make them less edible. A whopping 30% of forests in the Sierra Nevada mountain range between Lake Tahoe and Kern County were killed from 2011 to 2020 due to the combined devastations of fire, drought and bark beetles, according to <u>a UC Berkeley-led study published Thursday in Ecological</u> <u>Applications</u>. "It's kind of wake-up call, even to those of us that are kind of steeped in this field," Zackary Steel, the study's lead author, told the Sacramento Bee.

But Mom, Shooting People Online Is Making Me Smarter!

- Don't tell Timmy to stop playing that game and do his homework he's actually learning to control impulsive behavior and improving his ability to memorize information (maybe). According to a new study, <u>playing a lot of video games is associated with some cognitive benefits in children</u>.
- The study, conducted with 2,000 children ages 9 and 10, tested differences between children who played over 21 hours of video games per week and those who didn't play games at all. Researchers found that gamers performed better than non-gamers in tests for controlling impulsive behavior and memorizing information, and that gamers showed more activity in areas of the brain associated with attention and memory during the tests. Researchers controlled for many other variables including gender, parental income, and video viewing.
- Despite showing the difference in cognitive activity between gamers and non-gamers, researchers can't say if games grant cognitive benefits to kids, or if the kids with cognitive benefits sought out games more than their peers. At the very least, the study adds to a body of research that indicates that video games aren't *actually* melting our kids' brains. Some companies are developing video games that can treat trauma, and the FDA has even approved some video games as a treatment for ADHD. (Axios)

<u>Trail of Tears</u> <u>Chief Seattle, Si'ahl (1786-1866)</u>

Duwamish and Suquamish tribes of the Salish Peoples, Puget Sound, Washington Called Sealth by his native Suquamish tribe, Hudsons Bay Company traders gave him the nickname Le Gros, "The Big Guy". And he was. Broad-shouldered and standing around 6 ft tall, Seattle had an imposing presence that made people take notice.

As a six-year-old boy, Seattle witnessed British Captain George Vancouver's ships passing through Puget Sound in 1792. Later he also saw the devastation of disease brought by the white man to his native lands. As a young warrior, Seattle was known for his courage, daring, and leadership in battle against rival tribes in the area.

He inherited the position of Chief or Tyee from his mother's lineage, and by 1851, Chief Seattle was a strong leader respected for his peaceful ways, not his prowess at war. When the first wave of European settlers arrived in Puget Sound, he welcomed them, and immigrants saw him as an intelligent man striving to live amicably and peacefully with the newcomers.

Under Seattle's leadership, the Duwamish tribe helped their white neighbors immensely. They cleared land for new crops, provided seed potatoes, and cut down trees for canoes and housing, sharing their skills and knowledge with the immigrants.

Despite this, the 1850s were a dark time for the Salish peoples. Whites were making an influx to the Puget Sound area at an alarming rate, greedily claiming more land and causing discontent. Violence erupted, and Washington Territorial Governor Issac Stevens was only out to aid the European settlers and himself. Stevens began buying up or seizing Salish lands and removing the tribes to reservations. In 1854, Chief Seattle gave his famous speech, saddened that the day of his peoples had passed and the future belonged to the white man.

According to historynet: Three years later, an old and impoverished Tyee Sealth spoke one last time for the record, wondering why the treaty had not been signed by the Congress of the United States, leaving the Natives to languish in poverty. His words are heartbreaking.

"I have been very poor and hungry all winter and am very sick now. In a little while I will die. When I do, my people will be very poor; they will have no property, no chief and no one to talk for them."

Chief Seattle is buried at the Suquamish Tribal Cemetery on Washington's Kitsap Peninsula.
