"[The original grinder] of spice maker Gustav Brunn, an immigrant who escaped Nazi Germany in 1939 and was inspired by Baltimore's bounty of seafood from the Chesapeake [to create Old Bay]." – Baltimore Museum of Industry

Paralegal Specialist (Copyright Royalty Board)

The Library of Congress is accepting applications for a Paralegal Specialist, GS-09-11, until December 19, 2022.

Copyright is a form of protection provided by the laws of the United States (title 17, U.S. Code) to the authors of original works including literary, dramatic, musical, artistic, and certain other intellectual works. The position is Paralegal Specialist and reports to the Chief Copyright Royalty Judge.

GS-09 Level

This position acts as hearing room clerk during hearings, organizing and maintaining exhibits and other documents presented at the hearing, and handling other hearing room logistics; manages the judges' electronic filing and case management system; serves as a liaison with counsel for participants in CRB proceedings; manages the logistics of rulemaking proceedings, including serving as a liaison with the Office of the Federal Register.

GS-11 Level

This position acts as hearing room clerk during hearings, organizing and maintaining exhibits and other documents presented at the hearing, and handling other hearing room logistics; manages the judges' electronic filing and case management system; serves as a liaison with counsel for participants in CRB proceedings; manages the logistics of rulemaking proceedings, including serving as a liaison with the Office of the Federal Register; prepares the administrative record for appeals of the judges' determinations to the US Court of Appeals for the DC Circuit; performs legal research and analysis; monitors dockets and filings; and maintains legal files.

The [U.S. Department of Energy's \(DOE\) Office of Fossil Energy and Carbon Management \(FECM\)](#) is looking for a diverse pool of individuals to review the equity, justice, jobs, and community engagement sections of funding opportunity applications. Compensation is available. To apply to review, send your resume to SCI_FECM@NETL.DOE.GOV.

Reviewers should have academic, subject matter, and/or practitioner experience in at least one of following areas:

- Diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility (DEIA);
- Community and stakeholder engagement;
- Workforce development and quality jobs; and
- Environmental justice.

The benefits of reviewing can include:

- Bringing your professional expertise and lived experience to help inform FECM's funding decision;
- Gaining practical knowledge of the merit review process for FECM;
- Building your network by meeting new colleagues and potential partners;
- Being compensated for your review; and
- Engaging with FECM staff and contractors through a limited and clear time commitment.

Applying to be a reviewer allows you to be considered within a pool of reviewers for the Office of Fossil Energy and Carbon Management. Applying does not guarantee selection as a reviewer. In addition, DOE must ensure that selected reviewers do not have conflicts of interest and will discuss this with you prior to initiating a review of applications.
