

"The Lakota, call Bigfoot Chiye-tanka "chiye" means "elder brother" and "tanka" means "great" or "big". In English, though, the Lakota usually call him "the big man". "There is your Big man standing there, ever waiting, ever present, like the coming of a new day," Oglala Lakota Medicine Man Pete Catches "He is both spirit and real being, but he can also glide through the forest, like a moose with big antlers, as though the trees weren't there... I know him as my brother... I want him to touch me, just a touch, a blessing, something I could bring home to my sons and grandchildren, that I was there, that I approached him, and he touched me." Ray Owen, son of a Dakota spiritual leader. "They exist in another dimension from us, but can appear in this dimension whenever they have a reason to. See, it's like there are many levels, many dimensions. When our time in this one is finished, we move on to the next, but the Big Man can go between. The Big Man comes from Creator. He's our big brother, kind of looks out for us. The existence of The Big Man is taken for granted throughout North America, and so are his powerful psychic abilities. The Big Man knows when humans are searching for him and that he chooses when and to whom to make an appearance, and that his psychic powers account for his ability to elude man's efforts to capture him or hunt him down. In Native culture, the entire natural world, the animals, the plants, the rivers, the stars is seen as a family. The increasing appearances of the big man are not only a message or warning to the individuals or communities to whom he appears, but to humankind at large. A messenger who appears as a warning from Creator that man's

How the music of an ancient rock painting was brought to life

A section of the Cederberg rock painting, digitally enhanced to emphasise red-ochreous colours. © Neil RuschArchaeologists spend a lot of time examining the remains of distant pasts, which includes the study of rock paintings. This is largely visual work – but sometimes we can "hear" the ancient past using acoustic methods. Our archaeoacoustic research is focused on bringing to life sounds made by people living in the past. No aural record remains but people did dance, sing and clap. Instruments

**Looted ancient sarcophagus returned to Egypt from US** 

An ancient wooden sarcophagus that was featured at the Houston Museum of Natural Sciences was returned to Egypt after U.S. authorities determined it was looted years ago, Egyptian officials said Monday. The repatriation is part of Egyptian government efforts to stop the trafficking of its stolen antiquities. In 2021, authorities in Cairo succeeded in getting 5,300 stolen artifacts returned to Egypt from across the world.

## Calling all Beaders, Quilters, Painters... Artwork Needed for new Oyate Health Center Published in: OHC News

All forms of art are being considered for the new Oyate Health Center.

RAPID CITY — In early November, the Great Plains Tribal Leaders' Health Board and the Oyate Health Center submitted proposals for artwork to be displayed in the new facility. The deadline for one of these proposals has been extended to midnight on January 9, 2023.

Across the new Oyate Health Center (set to open in February of 2023), there are more than 60 locations where the artwork will be placed inside the new building. The Oyate Health Center requests that artists interested in contributing art submit proposals to fill these voids. Artists will be compensated for their contributions, and all art forms will be considered once submitted.

The Great Plains Tribal Leaders Health Board (GPTLHB) welcomes enrolled tribal citizens living within the areas outlined in the proposal to apply to the request for proposals for artwork to be purchased for display at the new Oyate Health Center (OHC) facility on the former Sioux San Campus in Rapid City, South Dakota.

See below proposal parameters (artist eligibility), selection criteria, and application package requirements.

#### PROPOSAL PARAMETERS

Artist Eligibility Groups: The GPTLHB and Art Committee would like to support artists living in the Great Plains Area as well as have a direct economic impact on the relatives we serve. Thus, priority will be given to artwork submitted by artists who fall into the three priority categories below:

- I. Enrolled tribal citizens with a federally recognized tribe who live in the Black Hills Area (Rapid City Area/Pennington County).
- II. Enrolled tribal citizens with a federally recognized tribe who live in the Great Plains Area (lowa, Nebraska, South Dakota, and North Dakota).
- III. Enrolled tribal citizens with a federally recognized tribe from the Great Plains Area (Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota, and North Dakota), who live outside the Great Plains Area
