Youth Futures Fellows representing over 10 campuses across the state released their "Our Dreams, Our California: A Youth Manifesto for the Future" outlining a vision for the future that is inclusive, resilient and sustainable for the next century. The Manifesto was released at the inaugural Youth Futures Summit in Sacramento which brought together more than 500 youth organizers to the State Capitol's West Lawn on Sunday, March 12. California and highlighted calls to action that we can take today to make our dream of tomorrow a reality.

The visions and activities celebrated throughout the day, echoed and uplifted the "Our Dreams, Our California: A Youth Manifesto for the Future," a comprehensive document that included vision statements, solutions, strategies, and commitments. Their 8-10 point platforms detailed visions for what young people want to see in the next 10, 30, or 100 years. The dreams were powerful and declarative, and covered every public policy issue in California....

All Youth Futures Summit attendees were encouraged to partake in the youth-led visioning movement and had the opportunity to share their visions and dreams for California's future on postcards to California's most influential elected officials and leaders. These responses were compiled and hand-delivered by California 100 Futures Fellows to Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon and Senior Advisors to Governor Gavin Newsom.

After the dams: Restoring the Klamath River will take billions of native seeds

Jefferson Public Radio, 3/17/2023 - On the north shore of Iron Gate reservoir, Frank Henry, Jr. jams a heavy metal pole into the ground and twists. Once a hole is excavated, he grabs a stick from a five-gallon bucket. Water drips from the small tangle of roots at one end. The stick is Klamath plum; it will eventually grow into a shrubby tree that forms dense thickets and produces mauve-colored fruits.

The decision by state water officials to bypass environmental rules for water storage allowed greater harm to salmon populations and amounts to a civil rights violation for Native American tribal members, argue Kasil Willie, staff attorney for Save California Salmon and a member of Walker River Paiute Tribe, and Regina Chichizola, executive director of Save California Salmon.



The awesome scope of George Lucas's billion-dollar museum is finally taking form in Los Angeles. The Lucas Museum of Narrative Art will hover like a low-flying spaceship, with enough gallery space to fill one and a half football fields. It takes 15 minutes to walk across the campus. Researchers Map Fruit Fly Brain

Researchers <u>fully mapped the brain of a complex organism</u> – in this case, a fruit fly – for the first time

- Brains contain neurons, or nerve cells that send signals and control what humans think, feel, and do. They communicate through spaces called "synapses"
- Past researchers have fully mapped the brains of earthworms and the larvae of a sea squirt, but those are relatively simple and have limited practical use
- A new study produced the first 3D-printed map of a fruit fly's brain, which is the size of a poppy seed. In total, it identified 3,016 neurons and 548,000 synapses
- Scientists say this could lead to future brain mapping

• Fruit flies' brains are vastly more complex than past mapped brains: Fruit flies can learn, navigate complicated landscapes, process smells, and weigh risks and benefits. Researchers say this new 3D model could open the door to future research on how the brains learns, process memories, and responds to stimuli

National Audubon Society Votes to Keep the Name of an Enslaver

The move has been criticized by some local chapters that have severed ties with naturalist and slaveholder John James Audubon

Extract "In 1834, Audubon criticized abolition, writing that Britain had acted "imprudently and too precipitously" when ending slavery in its Caribbean territories, the <u>Art Newspaper</u>'s Benjamin Sutton wrote last year. During expeditions across North America, Audubon and ornithologist John Kirk Townsend <u>stole human skulls</u> from burial sites of Native Americans and Mexican soldiers. They sent the remains to Samuel George Morton, who used them in his racist pseudoscience that asserted human races could be ranked in intelligence. After his death in 1851, Audubon was also accused of, "and most certainly committed," plagiarism and academic fraud, per the National Audubon Society."

Fossil Dispossession of Sioux Lands

Thursday, March 30, 6:00–7:00 pm ET Zoom or Geological Lecture Hall, 24 Oxford Street, Cambridge

The continental interior of the United States—home to many Native American communities—is a region rich in fossils. Since the nineteenth century, fossils found on Native lands have been removed and placed in museums and universities without the consent of, or proper collaboration with Native Tribes. Lawrence Bradley will discuss the history of fossil dispossession from Sioux lands and the legal frameworks—or lack of—that allowed it to occur. He will also examine the role that fossils taken from these lands have played in establishing vertebrate paleontology as a scientific discipline in the United States. Finally, he offers an approach to solving past and present disputes between Tribes and paleontologists.
