EPA Issues Fiscal Year 2022 Environmental Collaboration and Conflict Resolution Annual Report

The Office of Environmental Justice and External Civil Rights' <u>Conflict Prevention and Resolution Center (CPRC)</u> has issued this year's annual report on environmental collaboration and conflict resolution (ECCR) at EPA. This report highlights the EPA's key achievements in providing ECCR in fiscal year 2022 and the infrastructure that supports this work. ECCR continues to be an essential tool used to advance the Agency's goals, including tackling the climate crisis, taking decisive action to advance environmental justice and civil rights, and strengthening tribal, state, and local partnerships.

The CPRC supports EPA's regulatory, enforcement, and voluntary programs by providing alternative dispute resolution (ADR) services to the entire agency. Expert CPRC staff, specialists in ADR in the EPA's 10 regions, as well as professionals engaged through the CPRC's Conflict Prevention and Resolution Services contract, help EPA and its stakeholders exchange ideas and information, identify areas of concern and common interest, develop recommendations, prevent and overcome disputes, and reach agreements. Every office at EPA has access to this contract to quickly hire professional neutral facilitators and mediators to assist with preventing and reducing conflict associated with their environmental projects. The CPRC supports ADR across the Agency, pursuant to EPA's ADR Policy.

Native American Story

This is a picture of **Standing Holy, who is listed as Sitting Bull's daughter**. It brings to mind the traditional Oceti Ŝakowiŋ style of parenting. The first time that Sitting Bull traveled and observed non-Native people spanking their children, he was shocked.

There was never a need to continually scold a child, belittle them, or strike them. They cuddled their children from birth to about seven because they believed crying wasn't good for children. Often, if a child did not stop crying, some grandmothers would cry along with them to help them get over whatever had made them sad.

At an early age, they begin to take on the responsibility of their clothing and bedding. Our people traveled with the buffalo and had to be mobile. By the age of 10, most of our children knew how to take care of the materials needed for travel.

Love, teaching, structure, and community raised our children.

Colonization tells us that physical discipline helps shape our children and turn our boys into men. Yet, without ever being spanked, we produced the greatest warriors that ever walked this land. Our lifeways and ceremonies through the different stages of life were more valuable than anything colonization offered.

<u>Session Highlight: Paper session 8: Deep Viewpoints: Using Citizen Curation to challenge the Participation Gap</u>

The museum field has undergone massive change since the first MuseWeb conference in 1997. The internet was relatively new as a consumer service, smartphones and texting didn't exist, and even photography was frowned on and rarely allowed. Discussions of transparency were typically about windows and displays.

At Paper Session 8, The Future of Museums, we invite you to join us for a look back and then to turn our eyes forward. T. Leo Cao will discuss how museums' definitions of openness have changed since 1997 with a fascinating analysis of MuseWeb papers presented since the earliest days of this conference. He'll show how museums have gradually shifted from an internal to external focus where openness is concerned. Radha Nagaraja will talk about the nature of the data museums use and the challenges that arise when data comes from many different sources. Is there a way to make sense of it all? Paul Mulholland will show how lack of perceived relevance may be a substantial barrier for people to even think about visiting a museum in the first place. He will show how citizen curation can help reduce this barrier by allowing visitors to tell their own stories and share their own perspectives on a museum's collection.

Taken together, these three papers will give a fascinating insight on where our field has come from and show us steps we can take to keep moving forward.
