

Northern California's Klamath River is about to be unshackled for the first time in a century

. Last fall, workers removed one of four dams slated for removal along the mighty waterway. This month, crews will allow the reservoirs behind the remaining three to drain ahead of the full removal of the dams later this year. "We're now pulling the plug and throwing it away," said Frankie Myers, a Yurok tribal leader. "Not to get too mushy about it but being able to look at the river flow for the first time in more than 100 years, it's incredibly important to us."

Lost Cities Revealed

Archaeologists have discovered a constellation of <u>ancient Amazonian structures</u> in what is now modern-day Ecuador, according to new research published yesterday. Flourishing for roughly 1,000 years about two millennia ago, the settlements are believed to have been populated by 30,000 residents at their peak—roughly equal to London under the Roman Empire at the same time.

The complex was discovered using LiDAR (light detection and ranging), a technique in which variations in surface height are measured using airborne laser mapping. The approach allows researchers to penetrate dense forest canopies or layers of Earth, revealing what lies underneath without labor-intensive fieldwork and digs. Learn more about how LiDAR—also used in many self-driving vehicles to "see" the road—has <u>revolutionized archaeology</u>.

The find follows a number of similar discoveries in recent years, including a <u>sprawling urban</u> <u>network</u> in the Bolivian Amazon two years ago.

- **Jan 15 1838** The Treaty of Buffalo Creek was signed relocating the Senecas from Nwq York to west of Missouri.
 - 1891 Elko newspapres reporting state militia was a "weak reed" in Tuscarora....guard officers "resigned and disbanded the company at the first intimation that they would be called to arms to protect settlers from the Indians".
 - 1965 RSIC voted to join ITC.
- **Jan 16 1949** Nevada State Journal published an interview with UNR professor Charlton Laird about his new novel "Thunder On the River" about Sauk chief Black Hawk.
- **Jan 17 1893** Hawaii's monarchy was overthrown as a group of businessmen and sugar planters forced Queen Liliuokalani to abdicate.
 - **1936** Additions made to the Ft McDermitt Reservation through 49 Stat 1034.
- **Jan 18 1862** Confederate Terriroty of Arizona, considstting of the lower halves of New Mexico and Arizona, established.
 - Governor Henry Blasdel informd the Legislature of last addition to Nevada's original boundaries, an at expense of AZ in acceptance of about 18,000 square miles of AZ Territory land near the Colorado River. (call me if you want the rest of the story. sdc)
 - **1898** John Mayhugh was appointed Indian agent for the Western Nevada Agency in Nevada.


