The right to vote stands as a hard-fought victory for Native peoples -- yet its preservation continues to be in jeopardy. That's why this year we're expanding our Natives Vote campaign, mobilizing "moccasins on the ground" in 10 key states to overcome voter suppression intended to silence our communities.

In 2022, we demonstrated growing political power in the midterms, with historic Native turnout and youth turnout. Now we're in an even more critical election year, and right-wing-controlled states continue to attack all of our voting rights in an attempt to suppress voter turnout. Congress must act to protect and expand voting rights!

<u>Please add your name to join us in supporting Rep. Nikema Williams' and Sen. Elizabeth Warren's Youth Voting Rights Act now.</u>

The legislation would expand voter registration at colleges and universities, allow voter preregistration nationally, mandate on-campus voting locations, allow student IDs to be used for voter identification, and more. In recent years as young people have become increasingly vocal on critical issues affecting our communities, youth voter turnout has also surged.

But the backlash from right-wing state legislatures has been swift. In 2023, 14 states enacted 17 restrictive voting laws meant to suppress the vote. In six of those states, the Native vote determines the outcome. And late last year, a Trump-appointed federal judge gutted the Voting Rights Act by undermining its protections against racial discrimination.

We need legislation that counteracts voter suppression laws in order to make voting more accessible for Indigenous communities, People of Color, and young people who face extra barriers when trying to register and vote.
