Colorado River basin states pitch two alternative plans

Dear Editor and Staff,

This letter to the Editor is in response to Alan Halaly's article on 3-3-24, "Just Beneath the Surface" on lithium rush **to educate the Las Vegas Review Journal staff about abuse of the Shoshone people** by propaganda not unlike the first stories written about the Great Basin that accompanied the gold rush of the 1850's that led to the killing of Indigenous people. Not one word of the Shoshone property owners rights, title or interests is shoddy writing by the fourth estate we all rely on to tell the truth and the full story.

Property is not a thing but, a relationship between people in regard to things. That relationship in the Great Basin is the law by treaty and the Constitution Article 6, Section 2, treaties are supreme. The Treaty of Ruby Valley is in full force and effect and is omitted in your article. This is to advise you as the fourth estate that, the Shoshone Nation of Indians does not consent to the inclusion of our property into the boundaries or jurisdiction of any state or territory.

Your article is a propaganda strike at the sovereignty of the Shoshone people that ought be corrected by writing the complete story including the true facts that Shoshone title remains unextinguished. Ownership of the lands at issue in the Ioneer Rhyolite Ridge boron and lithium mines is Shoshone property as is the vast majority of the Great Basin. Nevada continues the violence against the Shoshone people by economically disenfranchising the indigenous owners of the land, a violence focusing discrimination on the Shoshone people and land. Nevada takes from Shoshone land and discriminates by returning nothing to the Shoshone yet every unit of local government receives funds except Native Americans. It is fraud, racketeering and, as aforementioned a violence against the Shoshone people who own the land.

A good example of the ownership question is the inability of the Department of Energy (DOE) to prove ownership of the proposed Yucca Mountain high-level nuclear waste repository. After spending \$15 billion dollars the DOE cannot prove ownership to the proposed site even with the Air Force and the BLM, the other BLM, the Bureau of Land Management master title plats that is the land status record of the US government because the Shoshone treaties (Consolidated Treaty Series, Volume 127-1863).

Our scoping comments last year bear out the facts and risks of radiation exposure. Your newspaper's story is an abuse no matter how you justify it. Do better research and investigate the issues thoroughly to protect the property owners and correct the abuse. Our primary comments are submitted to the BLM proponents project and below my signature are our supplemental comments.

Supplemental Comments of Ian Zabarte, Secretary of State of the Western Shoshone National Council of the Western Bands of the Shoshone Nation of Indians, Treaty of Ruby Valley 1863 (Consolidated Treaty Series Volume 127-1863).

Scoping Comments

The proponent Ioneer Rhyolite Ridge lithium mine acting under the agency of the US Department of the Interior, Bureau of Land Management pending funding from the US Department of Energy are seek to defraud the Western Bands of the Shoshone Nation of Indians of fights, title and interests that should accrue to the benefit of the Western Shoshone people. The United States makes no claim of ownership of Western Shoshone property rights defined by the Treaty of Ruby Valley and instead seeks to occupy and exploit the same treaty defined land.

The 1863 Treaty of Ruby Valley is in "full force and effect" in "Findings of Fact and Conclusion of Law" made by Bruce R. Thompson of the Federal District Court in Reno on remand from the US Supreme Court 1990 and no explicit extinguishment of Indian title has occurred. The only court to address the title issue was the Ninth Circuit Court in US v. Dann concluding that Western Shoshone title was not in issue and never actually litigated. The US Supreme Court did not in fact deem or change any facts of Western Shoshone title and instead crafted a term of judicial legislation inferring that Western Shoshone title was "deemed" somehow to be extinguished by the very acts contemplated by the treaty. No explicit act of Congress took place to extinguish Western Shoshone aboriginal title and no court could change the facts unless by fraud or malfeasance as is the case in US v. Dann. Therefore, the scope of the present environmental assessment must include the socioeconomic impact to the Western Bands of the Shoshone Nation of Indians from fraud and trespassing by the proponent through agency of the US Department of the Interior Bureau of Land Management inflicting conditions intended to bring about the destruction of the Western Bands of the Shoshone Nation of Indians in violation of the Treaty of Ruby Valley. Funds including taxes, royalties, grants or payments equal to taxes from Shoshone property at the mine site given to Nevada are violence against the Western Shoshone people, an economic war caused by trespass...taxation without representation. Nevada provides funds to every unit of local government except Indians that is racism.

Acts of US coordinate agencies on behalf of the proponent failing to understand and investigate the socioeconomic impact to the Western Shoshone people living on the land is environmental racism.

The Western Shoshone bear a disproportionate burden of risk from mine activities because of lifestyle differences not investigated or understood. Diet, mobility and shelter shaped over thousands of years are not know to the proponent and ought to be investigated for land and water use impacts. Failure to investigate and understand the living lifeways of the Western Shoshone people will produce impact to spiritual properties through physical impairment and psychological impact, a stigma or special effect.

Additionally, impact to spiritual belief in water-stigma effect;

Impact to Western Shoshone conservation lifeways-stigma effect;

Impact to shared sense of tribal community-stigma effect;

Impact to Western Shoshone freedom of religion-physical use impairment;

Impact to medicine plants needing water-physical effect;

Impact to medicinal mineral made with water-physical effect;

Impact to water used in medicinal treatments-physical impairment;

Failure to calculate risk using a culturally appropriate context resulting in a disproportionate burden or risk from impairment to the Western Shoshone people.
