#### **EPA announces initial selections for Community Change Grants Program**

Today, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency announced more than \$325 million in funding for 21 selected applications to help disadvantaged communities tackle environmental and climate justice challenges through projects that reduce pollution, increase community climate resilience and build community capacity. Made possible by President Biden's Inflation Reduction Act, the Community Change Grants Program is the single largest investment in environmental and climate justice in history. The funding announcement today is the first tranche of nearly \$2 billion from the program that was designed based on community input to award grants on a rolling basis.

These selected applications are the first to come under the Community Change Grants Program's rolling application process. Informed by robust stakeholder engagement and community feedback, the innovative rolling application process will ensure that applicants have ample time to prepare and take advantage of this historic resource. The Community Change Grants Program Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO), administered through the Office of Environmental Justice and External Civil Rights, is still accepting applications through November 21, 2024. EPA will continue to review applications and announce selections on a rolling basis.

Track I of the program, Community-Driven Investments for Change, is expected to award approximately \$1.96 billion for 150 projects for \$10-20 million each. The 17 Track I applicants who are implementing community-scale projects to address environmental and climate justice challenges are:

Track II, Meaningful Engagement for Equitable Governance, is expected to award approximately \$40 million for 20 projects for \$1-3 million each. Track II applicants who will facilitate individual and community participation in governmental decision-making processes are:

- Insight Garden Program and Ella Baker Center for Human Rights (multiple locations in CA)
- The Trust for Public Land and See You At The Top (Cleveland, OH)
- Special Service for Groups, Inc. and Center for Asian Americans United for Self Empowerment (Los Angeles, CA)

Of the 21 selections, three are for Target Investment Areas identified in the NOFO. Target Investment Area funding is intended to ensure that Community Change Grants Program funding is directed towards disadvantaged communities with unique circumstances, geography, and needs.

As the Community Change Grants Program is still accepting applications through **November 21**, **2024**, EPA encourages applicants to submit applications as soon as they completely meet the NOFO requirements. EPA will be making additional selections on a rolling basis for the remainder of 2024. EPA also encourages interested applicants to apply for technical assistance as soon as possible, as the last day to request new technical assistance is **August 16**, **2024**.

American Indian Reprorter July 1, 2024 \*

In Kevin Costner's first installment of his four- part epic Horizon: An American Saga, bands of settlers head west in search of a so-called promised land, where they can park their wagons and set up a new town. The only problem is that they're trespassing on Apache land, and the Indigenous inhabitants aren't happy about it.

While Chapter 1 of the Civil War-era saga, in theaters June 28, focuses mainly on white settlers and the U.S. military, the film also takes viewers into the White Mountain Apache community as its chief and his sons discuss the encroachment — as well as their varying takes on the violent response from some in the tribe.

Given the historically insensitive portrayals of Native Americans in film over the years, the Indigenous actors who signed onto Horizon wanted to make sure that their storylines and depictions wouldn't be problematic — as in, the men wouldn't just be the bad guys and the women their "over-sexualized" accessories.

"As a Native actor, when Westerns come along, you kind of have to be very, very careful and wary of what you get involved with," Tatanka Means, who is Navajo, Oglala Lakota, Yankton Dakota and Omaha, told Yahoo Entertainment.

He is the son of Russell Means, former leader with the American Indian Movement.)

While he said that digging into the script, "doing your investigations and ripping it apart," is always key, Means, who also starred in Killers of the Flower Moon, said that who's involved in the storytelling makes a big difference as well.

Among many Natives, Costner has earned that respect after his 1990 Academy Award-winning film Dances With Wolves not only employed many Indigenous actors but also offered empathetic portrayals.

"I think with Kevin and the way he handled things with Dances with Wolves and other Westerns that he's done, I think that trust was kind of established there," explained Means, who plays Apache warrior Taklishim in Horizon.
