#### Rosie the Riveters honored for service in WWII

Extract:

She was 16 years old at the time.

Erlinda Avila of Phoenix was just 15 when she worked as a riveter on B-25 bombers. It was hard work.

"From inside the wings, that's where I used to work," Avila says. "I was little enough I could crawl in the wings."

Avila says she was motivated to serve when her brother was drafted and sent to Japan, so she went to the Army recruiter.

"Rosie" Erlinda Avila was a riveter building bombers during WWII. She says doing the work was freeing for women. A family member honors her legacy with a tattoo.

"I've come to enlist," she told him. "I want to join the army."

She was turned away because of her gender. Avila was <u>undeterred</u>.

"I said, 'there must be something I can do.' That's when I heard that they needed girls, women to work in the defense plant."

Avila says it was freeing, noting that members of her Navajo tribe could not even vote at the time. Now, as she approaches her 101st birthday next month Avila offers words of wisdom to young women today.

"Don't ever give up. You can do it. Believe in yourselves."

Exploration between American Indian accessibility and nursing education PREP Awardee Ruben Garcia gets introduced to research as an undergraduate student

In this first-person narrative, Ruben Garcia, undergraduate researcher, tells Nevada Today about his experience researching American Indian accessibility and nursing education through the University of Nevada, Reno.

From a young age, I have always been fulfilled by learning and gaining new insights. There is something so special about coming up with a question about an unknown phenomenon and digging deep to expose the roots behind the truth. To fuel this passion for learning, I decided to engage in undergraduate research. While applying for the Pack Research Experience Program (PREP), I was in awe of the number of fascinating discoveries we are making on this very campus. However, one project stuck out to me more than the others.

As a first-generation Latino student making his best effort to build a future for himself, I stand behind the idea that everyone deserves a chance to pursue a higher education. Unfortunately, that is not the way life works, as we all have personal obligations on top of striving for a higher education. On the other hand, there are those who simply do not have the proper resources to attend a collegiate level institution. Therefore, I was immediately enthralled by the project, "Facilitators and Barriers of American Indian Access to, and Completion of, Nursing Education," overseen by Shannon Burleson, Ph.D., RN, CCRN, and assistant professor in the Orvis School of Nursing.

The big question the study aims to answer is: What facilitators and barriers are in place that restrict American Indian access to nursing education? To find out what is already known about this subject, we conducted a formal Preferred Reporting Items for Systematic Reviews Meta-Analysis (PRISMA) scoping review and are currently conducting a qualitative study in which we will interview specific groups to establish what is needed for American Indian success in nursing programs. From this data, we hope to inform program development for the Orvis School of Nursing. This program, which is currently being developed by Julie Sawyer, MSN, RN, will be a vital resource in providing aspiring American Indian nurses with the proper education and support to matriculate into and complete the nursing program at the University of Nevada, Reno.

Being a part of this research team has struck a new sense of curiosity within me. Research is never picture-perfect, which we have seen through multiple setbacks in our study. However, it is such a reward to see how your team will overcome setbacks and continue making progress toward discoveries. This research project has provided me with new insights on cultural humility which will undeniably help me in my future career as a registered nurse. Oftentimes, healthcare personnel are not properly equipped with culture-based training which results in healthcare workers not knowing how to approach patients from diverse backgrounds. This study has certainly allowed me to develop this new sense of humility and how to approach people, in general, with culturally respectful initiatives. Growing up in a pretty diverse town, I have always strived to make everyone feel safe and welcome around me. Through this project, I have learned that it is crucial to understand people through the lens of others before initiating solutions.

Our team conducted prior research engaging with American Indian liaisons to understand how we can approach their culture to be as respectful as possible. This inspired me to make an effort to understand everyone's culture prior to making assumptions and sharing my opinion. I have

become more aware of how to approach different cultures and understand the importance of making others feel seen. A big part of my job as a nurse will be to educate people on their health, and I know this new knowledge will allow me to more effectively teach my patients and approach them in ways that they understand. This is something that everyone can learn to make our society more inclusive and welcoming. More so, it has been a privilege to work alongside the faculty at the Orvis School of Nursing and build relationships with them as I prepare to enter their program and learn skills from them.

I have been inspired by this study to promote the alleviation of these barriers. It has been an honor to be a part of such a complex study. I have retained numerous skills as a researcher, and I feel confident in my ability to conduct research. This study has further fueled my passion for learning, and I cannot wait to see the development of the Orvis School of Nursing program being informed by our findings. If you are looking for your sign to get involved with research, this is it! Get out there and unveil an abundance of discoveries!

Transformative biomedical research program exposes undergrads to the world of microbiome science

# Three-week, hands-on summer program is no cost to accepted applicants; applications due by April 24

From bench to computer, the Microbiome Research Summer Boot Camp offers experience for undergraduate students interested in biomedical life sciences and data science.

Excellence, INBRE, in collaboration with the Nevada Bioinformatics Center hosted its third cohort for the Microbiome Undergraduate Summer Boot Camp. This three-week program introduced 19 students to a unique perspective in biomedical science. Participants developed skills in data analysis, laboratory safety and critical thinking. The curriculum combined hands-on

wet-lab techniques, such as DNA sequencing with computational methods, offering a comprehensive introduction to biomedical research.

On day one, the boot camp launched with a networking lunch, an introduction to the gut microbiome and laboratory safety training all before visiting students settled into the dorms in Reno. To prepare for lab work, students completed hands-on instruction in the STAR lab. They learned how to handle chemical spills and use fume hoods – essential safety skills for the advanced laboratory procedures taught by Assistant Professor of Nutrition Steven Frese in the College of Agriculture, Biotechnology & Natural Resources and his graduate student, Matthew Bolino.

In the spirit of the 2024 Summer Olympics, the Frese Lab, which is also supported by the University's Experiment Station unit, hosted its own "Laboratory Olympics," challenging participants across four scientific events. The first event tested lab-related math skills. Next came a fast-paced dilution challenge, measuring pipetting accuracy and speed. The third event focused on precision pipetting, requiring steady hands to navigate smaller gel wells. Finally, the cumulative round brought it all together as participants applied their knowledge and crafted a master-mix solution. Armed with their newfound skills, students extracted microbial DNA from samples provided by volunteers in the WOLFPACK Study. Students completed the DNA extractions and samples were sent to the Idaho State University Molecular Research Core Facility (RRID:SCR\_012598) for 16S rRNA sequencing.

After a week and a half in Reno, the students moved to the University's Lake Tahoe campus for data analysis. They learned coding in R, using packages like "DADA2," "pyloseq" and "ggplot2" to create visually compelling graphs of microbial species diversity.

Students developed and refined individual research questions, exploring topics such as the relationship between household pets and the effects of food insecurity on microbiome health. Students were empowered to direct the research, tackling questions that held personal significance.

Beyond lab skills, the boot camp featured workshops and presentations that offered insight into the life of a student researcher, including how to apply to medical school, graduate student life and the importance of professionalism. The program was designed to foster connection through group projects while giving students time to explore Reno and Tahoe. Group hikes, park visits, movie nights and shared meals created lasting memories and forged strong friendships, laying the foundation for future professional relationships.

Nearing the end of the boot camp, students prepared for the 2024 Wolf Pack Discoveries Symposium. For many, this was their first time presenting a scientific poster. To prepare, students engaged in workshops, mock presentations and multiple stages of feedback, honing their science communication skills. The result was that all students confidently presented their methods and the significance of their research to other students and the public – a fitting finale to the program.

The 2024 Microbiome Undergraduate Summer Boot Camp was a resounding success. Over three immersive weeks, aspiring researchers gained hands-on experience in the biomedical research,

from bench work to data analysis to presenting their findings. Along the way, they built lasting connections with their peers and faculty who dedicated their time and expertise to the program.

The students wish to give special thanks to Steven Frese, Ph.D., and Matthew Bolino for their invaluable training in DNA sequencing techniques and engaging talks on microbiome science. They also extend their heartfelt gratitude to Juli Petereit, Ph.D., whose vision and unwavering support made this program possible. Her kindness, dedication to student success and inspiring mentorship continue to bring out the best in everyone she guides.

About 264,000 acres of public land in Nevada's Ruby Mountain are now available for oil, gas and geothermal development as part of President Donald Trump's "Unleashing American Energy," executive order. The directive reverses a December 2024 decision by the Biden administration to withdraw the land from energy leasing for up to 20 years.

The decision aims to incentivize oil and gas production on federally-managed public lands, of which Nevada has <u>over 80 percent</u>. However, the geological make-up of Nevada means there is <u>little oil and gas</u> in the state.

The Nevada Current's Jennifer Solis also writes the reversal comes at a time when the United States Forest Service announced plans to open nearly 43 million acres of National Forest System land to timber production and designate 112 million acres for wildfire fuel reduction, which also includes the Ruby Mountains.
