The “people of the cloud forest” developed the high-altitude site



- Archaeologists with the World Monuments Fund uncovered over 100 previously unknown archaeological structures in Peru’s Rio Abiseo National Park.
- The area in and around the park was the home of the Chachapoya civilization from the seventh through 16<sup>th</sup> centuries.
- Located over 6,500 feet above sea level, the members of this civilization were known as the “people of the cloud forest.”

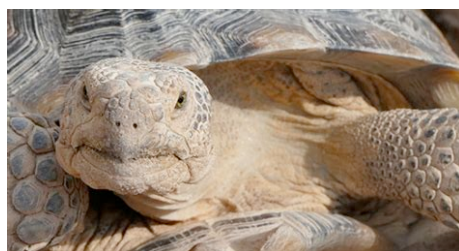

Mojave Max, the popular desert tortoise who resides at the Springs Preserve and is Southern Nevada's version of Punxsutawney Phil, has not yet emerged from brumation (reptilian hibernation), breaking his previous emergence record of April 24, 2023. The tortoise, who is sequestered in a deep burrow, has remained in brumation because of low air and ground temperatures.

**Today's selection-- from *Hard Neighbors* by Colin Calloway.** In 1763, a group of hardscrabble frontiersmen in Western Pennsylvania massacred twenty Conestoga Native Americans, all because they believed Pennsylvania's government had not provided sufficient military defense against Native American frontier attacks. For his part, the Governor—very much a representative of the colony's elite—considered Native Americans valuable trading partners that were under his protection. It was the first armed outbreak in an increasingly hostile relationship between these Western Pennsylvanians and the elite in its port city of Philadelphia that would lead to the complete dissolution of Pennsylvania's government thirteen years later:

"[Western Pennsylvanians] John Harris and John Elder repeatedly asked the colonial authorities to move the Conestogas out of harm's way because Delaware and Shawnee raids had incensed the colonists in the Paxton region. Elder told Governor John Penn in October 1763 that there could be no safety for the frontier settlements 'till that Branch of the River is cleared of the Savages.' He evidently meant all Indians. Penn replied that the Indians of Conestoga had the support of the governor. 'The faith of this Government is pledged for their protection. I cannot remove them without adequate cause.' As late as November 1763, the Conestogas asked Penn to appoint their friend Thomas McKee, who lived near them and spoke their language, to take care of them 'and see Justice done us.'

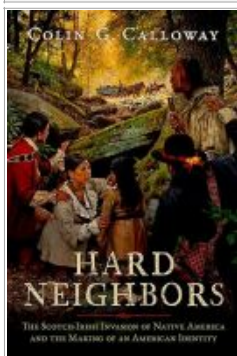
"On December 14, a group of Paxton Rangers murdered and scalped half a dozen Indian people at Conestoga Town. Although it occurred three years before she was born, one of Rhoda Barber's first memories was hearing people speak about the massacre. She had grown up in the area and in her old age she remembered the Conestogas as 'entirely peaceable' people who seemed as afraid of the enemy Indians as the whites were. Their cabins were close by, and Rhoda and her siblings sometimes passed 'whole days with them' and were fond of them. They made brooms and baskets which they bartered for food, 'and often spent the night by the kitchen fire of the farms round about, they appear'd much attached to the white people calling their children after their favorite neighbours.'

"But then, Barber recalled, things changed, and many people thought all the Indians should be destroyed. On the morning of the massacre, five or six men stopped at her father's house, their coats covered in snow and sleet. Her father did not know them, although he apparently knew what part of the country they were from. As was customary, he let them warm themselves by the fire and gave them refreshment. They left without telling what they had done, although her two brothers, aged ten and twelve, saw bloody tomahawks tied to the saddles on their horses and a gun they recognized as having belonged to a little Indian boy named Christie ('Chrisly' in some accounts), who was about their age and a playmate. Then a messenger arrived with news of 'the dreadful deed' and her father and others went to see them buried. Barber was shocked by the sight of the dead bodies, which lay among burned-out cabins 'like half consum'd logs.' Christie or Chrisly evidently escaped and carried the news of the massacre to Thomas McKee. It was a temporary reprieve.

"Writing to John Elder two days after the massacre, Edward Shippen described the murder of people known to be under government protection as 'riotous behaviour of flying in the Face of the Government,' and he was right. Elder was the commander of the Paxton Rangers and a religious leader in the community. That same day, Elder wrote Governor John Penn, claiming that he had tried to prevent the killings which were

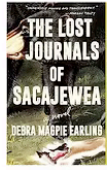
## [Wendy Red Star, Searching for Chief Plenty Coups](#)

#### **Wandering Stars by Tommy Orange**

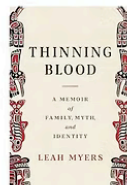

#### **Powwow Summer by N. Shingoose**

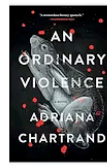

#### **Thinning Blood: A Memoir of Family, Myth and Identity by Leah Myers**

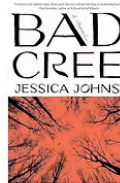
Leah Myers may be the last member of the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe in her family line, due to her tribe's strict blood quantum laws.

#### **An Ordinary Violence by A. Chartrand**

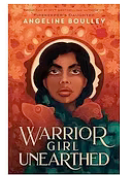

#### **Bad Cree by Jessica Johns**

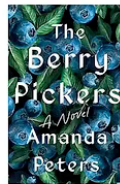

#### **Berry Pickers by Amanda Peters**

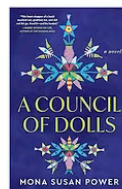
