


Many tribes believed the oak trees were placed on Earth to take care of the people. The gathering of acorns wasn't only survival, it was a way of living in balance with nature and honoring the trees that fed them. Acorns were also tied to ceremony and prayer. Some tribes gave thanks to the oak trees before collecting, asking permission and showing respect. In this way, food was never just food — it was part of the spiritual relationship between people, the land, and all living things because of this deep connection, acorns became a symbol of strength, survival, and community. Facing our darker history: As the feds censor narratives about racism, local officials tell the truth about Reno's Chinatown and its government-ordered destruction

Extract:

A new interpretive panel on Lake Street, historians said, has great relevance today, as the Trump administration's immigration policies and <u>harassment of immigrant communities</u> haunt the headlines. The administration also is <u>censoring websites</u>, <u>libraries and museums to erase mentions of civil rights struggles</u>, <u>discrimination and other darker aspects of the American experience</u>. To dwell on such things, <u>Donald Trump's executive order says</u>, "deepens societal divides and fosters a sense of national shame."

The policy is an attempt to replace facts with propaganda, some historians say.

"History is rhyming, if not repeating," said Michael Green, associate professor of history at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. "Sometimes you don't see violence against people, but what happens is violence against history, against language, against feelings."

When we fail to acknowledge our history, Green said, "We open the door for more of the same —or worse. We ought to be adult enough to face our past. ... The xenophobia never goes away. The issue is whether you feel comfortable voicing it and displaying it. And lately, people have increasingly developed that comfort."

With the Chinatown marker and others around the city, Reno acknowledges its history, warts and all.



Regenerative Agriculture Case Study at TP Ranch


Northern Cheyenne rancher April Martin draws on cultural values and land stewardship practices to revitalize 580 acres using regenerative methods, including bale grazing, native grass seeding, cover cropping, and soil sampling, that improve both the land and her bottom line. Soil tests in 2024 show elevated organic matter and a surge in pollinators and earthworms, while her feed costs have dropped to just \$26.23 per cow, putting her net returns in the 70th percentile among comparable operations.

Through her work with the Environmental Defense Fund and the Intertribal Agriculture Council, April is exploring diversified revenue streams, including direct-to-consumer sales and grass-fed beef offerings.

As April puts it, "I hope my work shows my daughters the importance of caring for the land and how all parts of the ecosystem—from grasses to livestock—are connected."

Tens of thousands of hidden archeological sites could be buried deep within millions of square miles of dense Amazon rainforest. But the thick forest sprawled across nine countries is too vast and difficult for archeologists to physically survey, and many of those sites have gone undiscovered. That's why archeologists recently collaborated with OpenAI, the company behind ChatGPT, **on a public competition exploring large troves** of satellite images and remote sensor data for signs of undiscovered archeological sites.

Inside Hawaii's 'Forbidden Island'

Native Hawaiians can live on this paradise island rent-free. So long as they play by the owner's old-world rules.

Extract:

Nowhere is the Robinsons' influence stronger than on Niihau, where the family has preserved a version of mid-19th-century <u>Hawaiian culture</u> relatively untouched by the tourist-centric development that has overrun the rest of the state. The "Forbidden Island" has no WiFi, running water, or electricity outside of solar panels — locals wash their clothes in streams and light their homes with kerosene lamps. There are no cars and just one truck. Most travel is done by horse or bicycle. It remains the only place on Earth where the Native Hawaiian language is still the primary language spoken.

The several dozen native residents on Niihau are considered invited guests of the Robinsons, and are allowed to live there rent-free, as they have for generations. But in exchange, they must follow a strict set of rules that align with the owners' Calvinist beliefs. Vices like <u>drinking and drug-use</u> are punishable by permanent exile. Visitors, even family members of those living there, are allowed on only at the Robinsons' permission.

More articles on the Ohlone Plight mural OAKLAND artist Rocky Baird says his recently completed mural about the oppression of the Ohlone Indians is not a tribute to victims and villains. It is really a broader look at the struggle of the American Indians and their oppressors throughout modern time. The 25-by-10-foot mural on the side of Gaylord's Caffe Espresso at 41st Street and Piedmont Avenue shows Franciscan missionaries attempting to clothe an Ohlone Indian and teach him about the tools used in ranching. On the right, a somewhat shocked modern man and woman look on. On the left — in vivid colors and immaculate detail — Baird depicts the downfall of the Ohlone people and their culture, which thrived in the California coastal area between Point Sur and the San Francisco Bay until the 1700s. The painting shows a sickly green and twisted person whose body is ravaged by smallpox, measles and other European diseases. There is an evil-looking conquistador grabbing or wrestling with a man who turns into a ghost under protest. "It shows that through all the oppression, the soul of a person still remains intact and escapes those binds," Baird said. "A spirit of a person can't be boxed." The mural, "The Capture of the Solid. The Escape of the Soul," was completed in six months with the help of a \$5,000 Oakland City Cultural Arts grant.

Graham Greene, 'Dances With Wolves' Actor, Dies at 73

His role as Kicking Bird in the 1990 Kevin Costner film earned him a best supporting actor Oscar nomination.

Graham Greene, the Oscar-nominated actor from <u>Dances With Wolves</u>, died Monday in Stratford, Ontario, after a lengthy illness, his rep told *The Hollywood Reporter*. He was 73.

"He was a great man of morals, ethics and character and will be eternally missed," Greene's agent Michael Greene said in a statement to *THR*. "You are finally free. <u>Susan Smith</u> is meeting you at the gates of heaven," referring to the actor's longtime agent, who died in 2013.

Born on June 22, 1952, in Ohsweken on the Six Nations Reserve and a graduate of the Centre for Indigenous Theatre Program in 1974, the Canadian actor made his small-screen debut on the 1979 Canadian drama series *The Great Detective* and film debut in *Running Brave* (1983).

However, it was his role as Kicking Bird in the 1990 film *Dances With Wolves* that earned him a best supporting actor Oscar nomination. Out of its 12 nominations, *Dances With Wolves* won seven Academy Awards, including one for best picture.

The film launched Graham's career to new heights; he had performances in more than 200 film and television productions and starring roles at the Stratford Festival.

His other best-known films included *Maverick* (1994), *Die Hard With a Vengeance* (1995), *The Green Mile* (1999), *The Twilight Saga: New Moon* (2009) and Aaron Sorkin's *Molly's Game* (2017).

He also starred in *Thunderheart* (1992) opposite Val Kilmer, *Transamerica* (2005), *Wind River* (2017) and on the FX series *Reservation Dogs*.

Most recently, Greene starred in the Tyler Sheridan series 1883 and Tulsa King.
